General Information

The DG14 GPS receiver processes signals from the Global Positioning System (GPS) satellite constellation, the geostationary satellites from the Satellite-based Augmentation System (SBAS) network including: Wide Area Augmentation System network (WAAS), the European Geostationary Navigation Overlay System network (EGNOS), the Japanese Multi-function Transport System network (MSAS), and from 300kHz Beacon transmissions to provide real-time position, velocity, and time measurements.



In this manual, the term SBAS (Space Based Augmentation System) includes WAAS, EGNOS, and MSAS.

The DG14 has several options:

- GPS only— 14 GPS channels (you can limit to 12 channels of GPS)
- GPS + SBAS— 12 channels of GPS + 2 channels of SBAS. The [Y] option must be loaded for SBAS channels.
- GPS + Beacon—14 GPS channels + 2 Beacon channels (you can limit to 12 channels of GPS). The [N] option must be loaded for Beacon channels.
- GPS + SBAS + Beacon— 12 channels of GPS + 2 channels of SBAS + 2 channels of Beacon. The [Y] option must be loaded for SBAS channels, and the [N] option loaded for Beacon channels.

The DG14 uses fourteen discrete parallel channels for Coarse/Acquisition (C/A) code-phase (pseudo-range) measurements and carrier phase measurements on the L1 (1575.42 Mhz) band for the GPS, with the [Y] option installed. The DG14 can use two of the parallel channels for WAAS, EGNOS, or MSAS measurements. With the [N] option installed, the DG14 has two additional channels for Beacon signals.

The DG14 receives satellite signals through an L-band antenna and an external low-noise amplifier (LNA).

The DG14 is designed for stand-alone and differential GPS (DGPS) operation; it can operate as a base (reference) station or a remote (rover) station, providing or using real-time differential GPS corrections in RTCM SC-104 format (Version 2.2).

This chapter describes DG14 hardware and functionality, describes the RF interface connector and the power/input/output connector, options, firmware upgrades, and lists power requirements and environmental specifications.

Vibration testing was performed using 4 corner mounting holes. Performance may degrade with the use of the center mounting hole.

Functional Description

Upon application of power, the DG14 runs a built-in self test of its internal memory, and thereafter periodically self-tests various functions during normal operation. Test results are stored for output on command. After self test, the DG14 initializes its battery-backed RAM. If the battery-backed RAM fails self-test (due, for example, to a low battery backup condition), the DG14 clears and

reports the loss of stored data, then initializes its channels and begins searching for all satellites within the field of view of its antenna.

You can view the results of the start-up built-in diagnostics in the response from the **\$PASHQ,HST** command. Results from the periodic operational diagnostics can be viewed in the results of the **\$PASHQ,BIT** command. See **BIT: Operational Diagnostic Tests** on page 71, and **HST: Start-up Diagnostic Results** on page 94 for more information.

The DG14 can track all GPS satellites as specified in the Navstar GPS Space Segment/Navigation User Interfaces, ICD-GPS-200, Revision B. All 32 satellite PRN (pseudo-random noise) code numbers are programmed into the DG14's firmware. There are at least 24 satellites in the GPS constellation. As it acquires (locks on to) each satellite, the DG14 notes the time and collects almanac and ephemeris data for each orbiting satellite and stores this information in battery-backed memory.

- When tracking one satellite, the DG14 gets a time reference from that satellite's clock.
- When tracking three satellites, the DG14 computes and time-tags the horizontal position (2D) and velocity of its antenna. Input of an initial position estimate is not required. When it receives an appropriate command message from controller equipment through one of its serial communication ports, the DG14 sends the results of its computations to the designated port.
- With four locked satellites, the DG14 determines three-dimensional position and velocity. Stand-alone position accuracy is 2 meters Circular Error Probable (CEP) when Position Dilution of Precision (PDOP) is less than 4; velocity accuracy is 0.1 meter per second. Accuracy levels for position and velocity are subject to the US Government policy of Selective Availability (SA). When the DG14 is operating in differential mode, position accuracy improves to better than 1.0 m CEP.

The DG14 can compute up to 20 independent measurements per cycle (20 Hz), with no interpolation or extrapolation from previous solutions. Position and velocity computations are performed simultaneously using all the satellites in view. The DG14 uses instantaneous doppler values from four satellites to compute dynamic speed, allowing velocity computations to be made independent of the last position fix. All measurements are referenced to the WGS-84 (World Geodetic System-1984) ellipsoid model.

The DG14 features 14-channel/14-Satellite All-In-View operation; each of up to 14 visible satellites can be assigned to a discrete channel for continuous tracking. Each satellite broadcasts almanac and ephemeris information every 30 seconds; this information is recorded in DG14 memory automatically.

With the SBAS option installed, the DG14 can track up to two geostationary satellites at a time and make available the SBAS ranging, ephemeris, and

differential correction data through the serial ports. The DG14 can process SBAS corrections for differential positioning by converting the SBAS corrections to RTCM SC-104 corrections. For more information on how to use SBAS in differential operation, see Chapter 8, **Differential Operation** and “SBAS Commands” on page 313.

SBAS supplements GPS with a ground reference network which provides a real-time assessment of the system integrity. The stations use GPS data along with differential corrections to improve accuracy by broadcasting through geostationary satellites.

While satellite-based augmentation systems are developed to provide differential corrections and integrity data for satellite-based aviation, their signals are available free of charge to all other non-aviation satellite positioning users in the respective coverage areas.

With the Beacon option [N] installed, the DG14 can receive differential corrections from up to two different Beacon stations. For more information on how to use Beacon in differential operation, see “Beacon Commands” on page 324. The DG14 correction output is in RTCM-104 differential format. See “Beacon Operation” on page 286 for additional information.

Hardware Description

The DG14 is available as a board and as a sensor. From a functional point of view, the DG14 receiver consists of two major sections: The radio frequency (RF) section, and the digital section, where the signals from the GPS satellites are converted to digital format and processed.

Both the board and sensor versions of the DG14 have two plus an optional third RS-232 input/output (I/O) ports capable of two-way communication with external equipment, and a coaxial RF port for the antenna.

The RF port can accept GPS and SBAS from the GPS antenna. A Beacon+GPS antenna is used with the Beacon configured model. See “Antenna” on page 23 for more information on the antennae. The RF port also supplies power to the antenna/LNA through the cable, eliminating the necessity of a separate power cable for the antenna. Total power consumption (including the LNA) is approximately 2.0 watts for the board and 2.5 watts for the sensor.

Board Hardware

The DG14 Board is simply the DG14 GPS receiver board assembly without the enclosure, back-up battery, or wide range power supply. It requires a regulated input voltage of 5 VDC ($\pm 5\%$); typical power consumption is approximately 1.2 to

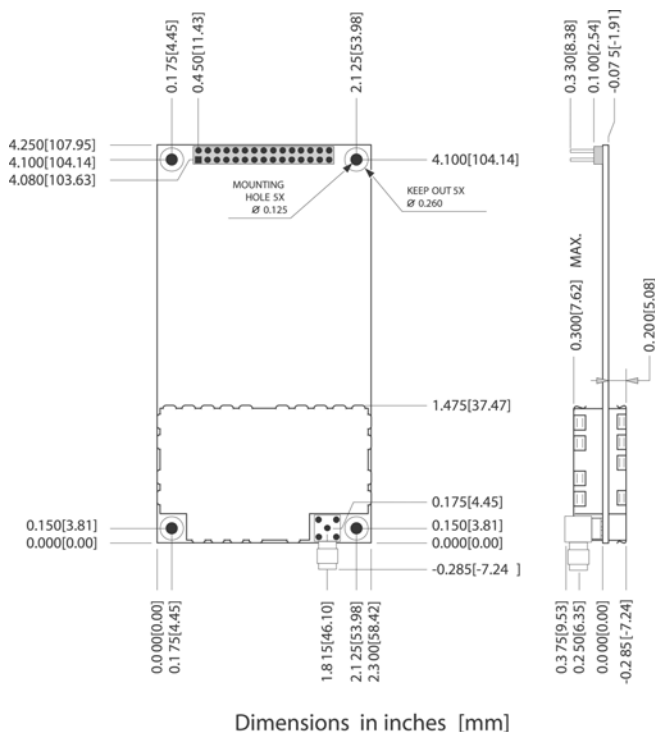
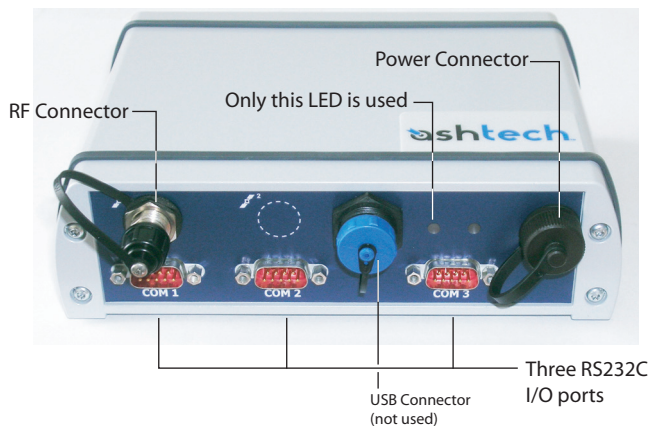


Figure 1.1. DG14 GPS Board Dimensions—Inches [mm]

2.0 watts depending on the configuration. User-entered parameters can be maintained in the DG14's internal memory by connecting a 2.5 to 3.5 volt external battery to the appropriate pins on the J801 connector. The physical dimensions of the DG14 GPS board are shown in Figure 1.1.



The 12-pin connector (J101) on the side of the board is intended for factory use only.

The DG14 uses a standard SMA connector for RF input.

ProFlex Lite-DG14 Sensor Hardware

The ProFlex Lite-DG14 sensor, Figure 1-2, contains the DG14 receiver board and a wide-range power supply in a rugged aluminum enclosure. It can accept input voltage levels from 9 to 36 V DC, and typical power consumption is approximately 2.2 W.

Status LEDs

The DG14 board has two status LEDs: a GPS Status LED and a Differential Corrections Status LED. The ProFlex Lite-DG14 sensor has only one LED (GPS Status LED).

DG14 Board LEDs

The DG14 board has a three-color LED on the board which indicates the status of the receiver. Upon power-up the status LED flashes red until a position has been computed. After computing a position, the status LED flashes yellow or green in between the red power status flash to indicate the status for each visible satellite. You can count the number of yellow or green flashes between the red flash to know the number of satellites visible in the sky. Table 1.2 indicates the color and status for the LED.

The Differential Status LED is a two-color LED providing information on the availability of differential corrections to the receiver. The LED shows the number of corrections received for each type: SBAS, Beacon, or Serial. The LED blinks with the following repetitive sequence:

- One red flash followed by the number of SBAS input corrections green flashes.
- Two red flashes followed by the number of Beacon input corrections green flashes.
- Three red flashes followed by the number of Serial input corrections green flashes.

The DG14 supports the use of external LEDs with the same features as the on-board LEDs.

ProFlex Lite-DG14 Sensor LED

The ProFlex Lite-DG14 sensor has a three-color front panel LED indicating the status of the receiver. Upon power-up the status LED flashes red until a position has been computed. After computing a position, the status LED flashes yellow or green in between the red power status flash to indicate the status for each visible satellite. You can count the number of yellow or green flashes between the red flash to know the number of satellites visible in the sky. Table 1.3 indicates the color and status for the LED.

Power Requirements and Connections

The power requirements and connections differ between the board and the sensor model.

Protections on ProFlex Lite-DG14 Sensor:

- Power input protected from overvoltages (70 V max.)
- Poxer input protected from accidental polarity reversal
- Power input protected from electrical disturbances caused by vehicles with 12 V and 24 V supply voltages (ISO 7637 standard).

Power Consumption in Sleep Mode

The DG14 has a sleep mode which operates similar to most laptop computers. While in sleep mode, the board consumes significantly less power. Power consumption in sleep mode does not exceed 7%. The sleep mode is particularly beneficial for operations which use batteries or solar panels for power levels. Use the **\$PASHS,PWR** command to set the DG14 to sleep mode. The DG14 will reactivate with serial activity or at designated dates and times via session programming. See “SES,SET: Individual Session Programing” on page 126 for more information.

Power Connections

All power and input/output connections are made at the J801 connector for the Board, and through the front panel connectors for the Sensor.

Attach the serial cable to the DG14 Sensor, and then connect the power source to the serial cable.

CAUTION

To avoid damage to the DG14 Sensor, verify that the power source is off while connecting or disconnecting cables to or from the unit.

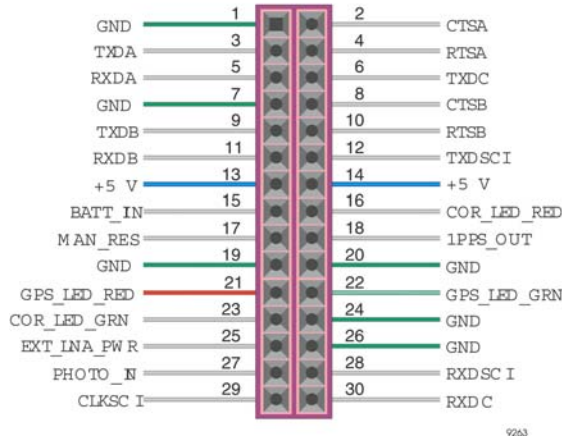


Figure 1.3. Pin Configuration of the J801Connector

J801 is a 30-pin male dual inline (15 x 2) header connector. It provides a host of useful connections in addition to power and I/O, including a connection for an external LED, a connection for battery-backup for RAM maintenance, an input for manual hardware reset, an output for a TTL-level timing pulse, a photogrammetry time-tag input, and a measurement strobe output. Figure 1.3 lists the pin assignments for the J801 connector. The power connect through the serial cable

CAUTION

To avoid damage to the DG14 board, ensure that pin 1 of the connecting cable is attached to pin 1 on J801 as indicated in the drawing. Verify that the power source is off while connecting or disconnecting cables to or from the J801 connector.

To save user-entered parameters between power cycles, connect the external battery to the corresponding input pins on the J801 connector and set the SAV parameter to Y.

CAUTION

- If pin 15 (BATT_IN) is not used, it should be connected to ground (GND)
- If pin 17 (MAN_RES*) is not used, it should be left open
- If pin 17 (MAN_RES*) is used, it can be pulled to ground (GND) using a switch, or driven to ground with an open-collector gate.

Backup Power

Power consumption on the back-up battery is 5 μ W (typical) and 50 μ W (maximum) with the external power supplies. The acceptable battery backup voltage range is 2.5 to 3.5 VDC.

Interfaces to External Equipment

DG14 Board Interfaces

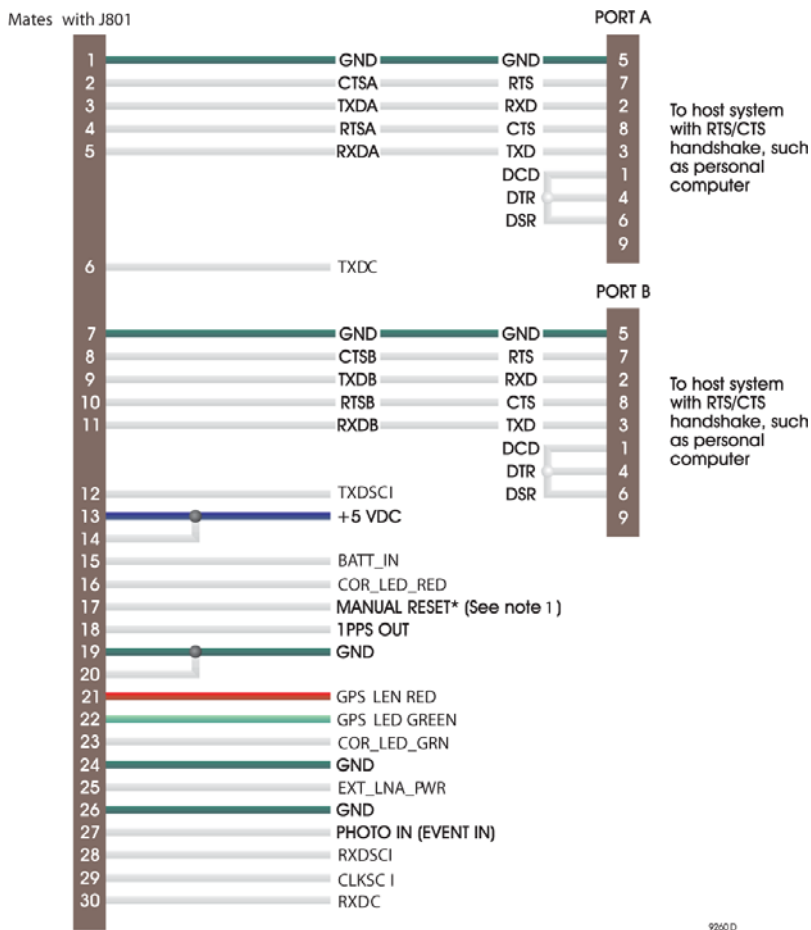


Figure 1.4. External Equipment Interfacing Diagram

The main interface to the DG14 Board is through the J801 connector. Figure 1.4 shows DG14 interfacing connections for the J801 connector.

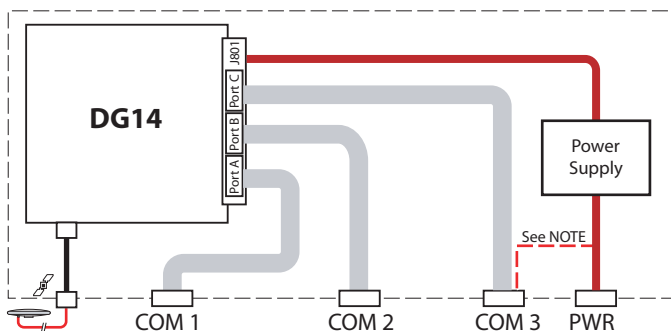

NOTE: The DC input power voltage (PWR IN on PWR connector) may be made available on COM 3 via its pin 4 (in which case DC OUT=PWR IN). Please contact the Ashtech Technical Support to make this possible.

CAUTION

If using COM 3 with DC OUT connected, limit the input voltage to +25 V. Voltage greater than 25 V may damage the device connected to COM 3.

Radio Interference

Some radio transmitters and receivers, such as FM radios, can interfere with the operation of GPS receivers. Ashtech recommends that you verify that nearby hand-held or mobile communications devices do not interfere with your GPS receivers before setting up your project.

Environmental Specifications

The operating temperature range of the DG14 is -30°C to +70°C; storage temperature range is -30°C to +85°C.

RF Connections

A 50-Ohm coaxial cable connects the GPS/Beacon antenna (with integrated LNA) to the DG14 RF connector and the GPS antenna. No separate cable is required to receive WAAS, EGNOS, MSAS, or Beacon signals. The DG14 can supply power to the LNA through the cable. All signals are received through the RF input.

The DG14 board's RF connector is a standard SMA female connector (TNC on the DG14 Sensor, see Figure 1.1). The SMA connector shell is connected to common ground on the DG14 board. The SMA center pin provides +4.8 VDC (to power the LNA) and accepts 1575 MHz RF input from the antenna; the RF and DC signals share the same path. The gain of the antenna LNA minus the loss of the cable is in between 20 and 30 dB. The DG14 includes an antenna protection circuit that limits the current in the antenna in case of short circuit. The current is limited at a level of about 70 mA.

CAUTION

The DG14 may be damaged if the RF connector center pin is not isolated from the DC ground. Use a DC block between the center pin and ground with the following characteristics:

- VSWR 1.15 maximum at 1575 MHz
- Insertion loss 0.2 dB maximum
- Maximum Voltage 5 VDC

The Altitude Limits Removed [A] and the Velocity Limits Removed [V] options require an export license.

For simplicity, this manual uses DG14 in reference to all three configurations. Any deviations from the standard operation will be discussed as necessary.

Receiver Options

The DG14 has a number of available options. The options that are set in the receiver will determine which commands and features you can use. For example, if the photogrammetry option is not installed, you will not be able to use the **\$PASHS,TTT** command to output event time tags from the serial port.

The **\$PASHQ,RIO** command queries for the receiver's configuration. The response message includes version numbers for the processor and channel firmware, a list of installed options, and the receiver's serial identification number. The response is output in the format:

\$PASHR,RIO,f1,f2,f3,f4,f5*cc

where Table 1.7 outlines the parameters.

CAUTION

Take the following precautions to avoid damaging your DG14 Board:

1. The power supply should be turned off each time the I/O-Power cable is connected to or disconnected from the J801 connector.
2. Ensure that when connecting the I/O-power cable to connector J801, pin 1 is correctly oriented per Figure 1.1.
3. Connect pin 15 (BATT_IN) to ground if it is not being used. Pin 17 (MAN_RES) should be left open if it is not being used.
4. Isolate the center pin on the DG14 antenna connector from DC ground. The DC block used between the center pin and DC ground should have the following characteristics:
 - 1.15 maximum VSWR @ 1575 Mhz
 - 0.2 db maximum insertion loss
 - 5 VDC maximum main line voltage
5. Connect the RAM back-up battery to the appropriate pins on connector J801 and set the SAV parameter to Y.

Firmware Upgrades

DG14 firmware is stored in flash memory. New firmware may be loaded into the receiver through either serial port using a PC. Maintenance releases of firmware are available on a regular basis to fix known bugs and to implement new features.

When embedding the DG14 within another system, Ashtech recommends that external access to one of the receiver's serial ports be designed into the system for direct monitoring. For example, many system integrators use an internal data cable to connect one of the DG14 serial ports to an external DB9 connector.

UDM Utility

If you have purchased the User Defined Messaging option [X], then you can use the UDM Utility program to create the script file which defines the custom messages. You can use the custom message feature to set the receiver to output only the information you need in a single message. This can save you from sending several receiver commands. See Appendix B, **UDM Utility** for more information.

Getting Started

This chapter is intended to get you started using the DG14 receiver. Please see the chapters on General Information, Basic Operation, Differential Operation, and Command/Response Formats for specific details regarding performance, power requirements, and commands.

This chapter discusses the following topics:

- Connecting the DG14 to power and the antenna
- Default parameters
- Communicating with the DG14 using standard communications software
- Sending common commands to the DG14

Connecting to the DG14

If you use equipment other than Ashtech-supplied with the DG14, it must comply with hardware specifications as described in the “Hardware Description” on page 4.

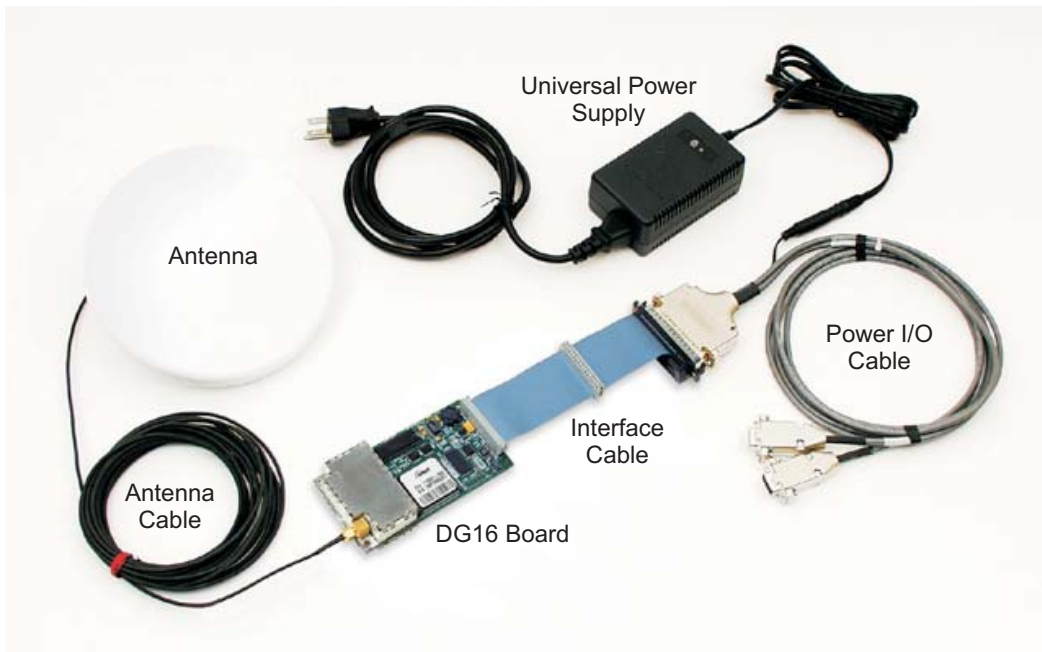


Figure 2.1. DG14 Board Connections

Figure 2.1 shows how to connect the components in the DG14 Board system.

Power

DG14 Board

Before applying power to the DG14 board, connect any controller devices or data logging equipment to the input/output ports of the DG14 by way of connector J301.

CAUTION

To avoid damage to the DG14, always turn off the power supply before connecting or disconnecting power to the connector J301.

1. Connect the female plug on the power cable to the J301 male connector on the DG14.
2. Connect the power cable to the power supply.

Once power is connected, the LED on the DG14 Board flashes red.

When you apply power to the power input pins on connector J301, the DG14 starts operation.

When you remove power from the power input pins on connector J301, the DG14 stops operation.

ProFlex Lite-DG14 Sensor

The power connects through the Power connector on the sensor front panel.

CAUTION

To avoid damage to the DG14, always connect the cable to the sensor before connecting the cable to the power source, and turn off the power supply before connecting or disconnecting power to the DG14.

1. Connect the serial cable to the serial port on the sensor.
2. Connect the power cable to the power connector.
3. Connect the power cable to the power supply.

Once power is connected, the LED on the sensor front panel flashes red.

Antenna

The DG14 is designed to work with an antenna Low Noise Amplifier (LNA) that requires five volts and is isolated from DC ground. The gain of the antenna LNA minus the loss of the cable is between 20 and 30 dB. Table 2.1 outlines the antenna requirements.

CAUTION

The DG14 may be damaged if the center pin of the RF connector (Type SMA) is not isolated from DC ground. Provide a DC block between the center pin and ground; the DC block should have the following characteristics:

- VSWR 1.15 maximum at 1575 MHz
- Insertion loss 0.2 dB maximum
- Maximum voltage 5 VDC

Connect the antenna cable directly to the antenna SMA connector on the DG14. Once power is on and the antenna is connected, the DG14 acquires satellites (SVs or Space Vehicles) within the field of view of the antenna. As a channel in the DG14 locks on to a satellite, the LED flashes green or yellow between the red power flashes for every channel in use (i.e., locked satellites). See “Status LEDs” on page 6 for a description of the LED flashes.

Important Default Parameters

Communication Port Setup

Table 2.3 lists the default communication parameters of the DG14:

When first establishing communications with the DG14, the communications interface must use this protocol.

Data Output Options

All the default data output commands are set to OFF. The DG14 does not output any data until you command it to do so.

Communicating with the DG14

After the DG14 is powered and running, you must send commands in order to receive data (such as antenna position). The following procedure describes how to send commands to and receive information from the DG14 using an IBM-compatible PC. You can interface with the DG14 using Evaluate Software™, RCS (Receiver Communication Software™), or standard communication programs such as ProComm or Hyperterminal. To begin, simply connect the standard 9-pin serial cable between port A on the DG14 and COM1 on the computer. When you are using other applications to communicate with the receiver, such as ProComm or HyperTerminal, verify that the <CR>/<LF> outgoing is enabled.

After setting up the interface for establishing communications with the DG14, you can send commands. The letters in the command can be typed in either UPPER or lower case. If you sent the command correctly, the DG14 responds.

The commands used with the DG14 are divided into two groups: set commands and query commands.

Use Set commands to change the DG14's operating parameters or turn on or off output messages. Set commands begin with the command string \$PASHS.

Use Query commands to request information from the DG14, such as the current operating parameters, current position, or DGPS status. Query commands begin with the command string \$PASHQ.

The DG14 responds to query and set commands by issuing an acknowledgement of a change in operating parameters or with the specific information requested through a query.

To become familiar with the DG14 messages, send a few common commands to the DG14 and observe the responses. In the following steps, command messages appear as COMMAND, and response messages appear as RESPONSE.



Chapters 5, 6, 7, and 8 contains details on these commands and responses, as well as the rest of the commands and responses supported by the DG14.

1. Type **\$PASHQ,PRT** and press **<Enter>**. This command queries the communication setup of the port. If you have connected the PC to serial port A, the response message is:

```
$PASHR, PRT, A, 5
```

This message indicates Port A of the DG14 is using its default communications setup 5: 9600 baud, eight data bits, no parity, and one stop bit.

See “PRT: Serial Port Baud Rate” on page 117 for more information on this command.

2. Type **\$PASHQ,STA** and press **<Enter>**. This command queries which satellites are locked and their signal strength at the time the command is sent. The response message typically might display:

3. If interfacing through port A, type **\$PASHS,NME,POS,A,ON,1** and press **<Enter>**. This commands the DG14 to return comprehensive position information through port A at a set rate. The default rate for NME commands is once per second. The response message output rate is 1 Hz:

The data string contains the position information, assuming the receiver is tracking a sufficient number of satellites to compute a position.

See “POS: Position Message” on page 245 for more information on this command.

4. If interfacing through port A, type **\$PASHS,NME,SAT,A,ON,1** and press **<Enter>**. This command tells the DG14 to return locked satellite information through port A at a set rate. The response message output rate is 1 Hz (default):

$PASHR, SAT, 03, 03, 103, 56, 60, U, 23, 225, 61, 39, U, 16, 045, 02, 21, U*6E
```

The data string contains the number of satellites locked plus the elevation, azimuth, and signal strength for each locked satellite, and also indicates whether a given satellite is used (U) or not used (-).

See “SAT: Comprehensive Satellite Tracking Data” on page 253 for more information on this command.

Basic Operation

This chapter covers a variety of DG14 operating parameters and options, including system setup, power-up, command format, serial port configuration, receiver settings and status, the satellite search algorithm, position modes, altitude hold definition, the ionospheric model, NMEA outputs, raw data outputs, differential operation, the photogrammetry option, the pulse-per-second option, and other options.

Message Formats

The DG14's three RS-232 ports (ports A, B, and the optional port C) can receive command messages from an external control device, send response messages to an external control device (such as a PC), output data to a separate data logging device, and send or receive differential corrections from a reference or remote station.

DG14 Input Messages

Input messages are comprised of set command messages, query command messages, and general command messages. These messages comply with the format defined in the NMEA 0183 standard to the following extent:

- NMEA 0183 ASCII byte strings following a dollar sign (\$) character
- Data fields are separated by commas
- Checksum character delimiter and NMEA checksum bytes are recognized by the DG14 but are optional. The hexadecimal checksum is computed by

exclusive OR-ing all of the bytes in the message between, but not including, the dollar sign (\$) and the asterisk (*).

- Messages end with the standard NMEA message terminator characters, [CRLF] (carriage return/line feed).

Input messages deviate from the NMEA standard as follows:

- Headers are Ashtech format
- Message IDs are Ashtech format
- Message length may exceed 80 characters
- Messages defined by the user with the UDM Utility and the [X] option installed

All command messages—set or query—can be composed in uppercase or lowercase characters. All command messages are sent by pressing **<Enter>**. A valid set command causes the DG14 to return the **\$PASHR,ACK*3D** (acknowledge) response message. A set command containing a valid \$PASHS header followed by character combinations unrecognized by the DG14 causes the receiver to respond with **\$PASHR,NAK*30**, a “not acknowledge” response message indicating that the command is invalid. Valid query and messages are acknowledged by return of the requested information. All invalid query and general commands cause the DG14 to return the **\$PASHR,NAK*30** “not acknowledged” response message.

DG14 Message Output

The DG14 can be programmed to send data to another device. Output messages include general receiver status messages, ACK/NAK messages, and GPS data messages. The general receiver status messages have free-form Ashtech formats. The acknowledged/not acknowledged messages and GPS data messages comply with NMEA 0183 standards as follows:

- NMEA ASCII byte strings following a dollar sign (\$) character
- Headers are standard NMEA or Ashtech-format NMEA
- Message IDs are standard NMEA or Ashtech-format NMEA
- Standard NMEA format messages contain hexadecimal checksum bytes
- Data items are separated by commas; successive commas indicate invalid or missing data (null fields)
- Messages end with [CRLF] (carriage return/line feed), the standard NMEA message terminator characters

User-Defined Messaging

If you have the User-Defined Messaging option [X] installed on your DG14, you can use the UDM Utility to define custom receiver commands to output receiver information to fit your specific application. This feature can minimize the number

of commands you need to send to the DG14 to acquire the output you require for your application.

Messages created by the user, using the UDM Utility, will respond with the ACK/NAK message.

See Appendix B, **UDM Utility** for more information on user-defined messaging.

Serial Port Configuration

The DG14 receiver has two primary RS-232 serial ports and one optional serial port (available as a firmware option [R]) that support two-way, full-duplex communication. The default protocol for transmitting or receiving data is 9600 baud, eight data bits, no parity, and one stop bit (8N1). The baud rate of the DG14 ports is adjustable using the **\$PASHS,SPD** speed set command; the data bit, stop bit and parity protocol is always 8N1.

DEFAULT SETTINGS
The default parameters for the DG14 serial Ports A and B: •Baud Rate— 9600 •Data Bits— 8 •Stop Bits— 1 •Parity— None

On initial power-up, or after issuing the **\$PASHS,INI** (receiver initialization) command or the **\$PASHS,RST** (restore defaults) command, the default data rate is 9600 baud for both standardized DG14 serial ports. Both are capable to 115,200 baud for data transfer.

The baud rates must be the same between the DG14 serial port and the serial port on the device with which it is interfaced.

To maintain communication with the DG14 while changing the baud rate, issue the **\$PASHS,SPD** (set port speed) to change the baud rate of the DG14 port, then change the baud rate of the command device to match the new baud rate setting on the DG14 port.

Session Programming

With the Session Programming feature, you can pre-set up to 10 observation sessions in the receiver. You can program the receiver to wake-up at a specified time and preform specified tasks such as output position and velocity data. In

addition, you can set a session time offset that shifts the session start and end times by a predetermined amount every day.

Session programming can also be used to put the receiver into sleep mode. When the receiver is in sleep mode, most of the receiver functions are suspended which conserves power. Using preset session start times, the DG14 automatically wakes up in time to perform specified tasks for the next session and returns to sleep when the session is complete.

Session programming is enabled by the **\$PASHS,SES** command. You must enable the individual sessions and set session parameters such as the start/stop times, recording interval, elevation mask, minimum number of satellites, and the data type for each session.

In addition, you need to set the mode (session in use switch), the session reference day, and the desired session offset. The mode is either Yes, No, or Sleep. If the mode is set to No, then session programming is disabled, even if an individual session is set. If the mode is set to Yes, then session programming is enabled, and any enabled individual sessions are activated. If the mode is set to Sleep, then the receiver goes into sleep mode, once an activated session has completed, and the DG14 wakes just prior to the next session.

The session reference day is a mandatory parameter that determines both the start day of session programming data collection and is used in conjunction with the Offset to determine the session start and end times. The reference day must be set equal to or earlier than the current day, or else the sessions will not run. If the reference day is later than the current day, then the session start and end times decrement by the offset multiplied by the numbers of days between the current day and the reference day. For example, suppose you wish to collect data everyday for seven days observing the identical satellite window on each day. Since the GPS window moves backwards four minutes per day, set the offset to 0400 and set the reference day equal to the current day. For each subsequent day of data collection, all sessions will start and end four minutes earlier than the previous day. By the seventh day the sessions will start and end 28 minutes earlier than on day 1.

Daisy-Chain Mode

The Daisy-Chain mode establishes a communication link through the GPS receiver, between a PC or handheld and a peripheral device. When the GPS receiver is in Daisy-Chain mode, all commands entering one serial port are passed out through another serial port. The commands are not interpreted by the DG14. Use the **\$PASHS,DSY** command to enable the Daisy-Chain mode and assign which serial ports to use.

A typical example of the use of Daisy-Chain mode is communicating with a radio through a handheld. The radio and handheld are not directly connected, but both are connected to the DG14 via separate serial ports. By enabling the Daisy-Chain mode between the two serial ports used by the handheld and radio, the handheld can communicate with the radio through the DG14.

For more information on the Daisy-Chain command, see "DSY: Daisy Chain Communications Mode" on page 77.

Satellite Tracking

When the DG14 is powered on for the first time, or when the power and back-up battery have been disconnected, there is no almanac or ephemeris data in memory. In these cases, the DG14 assigns the first 12 elements of a 32-element table of SV PRN numbers to its 12 channels as it begins searching for satellites. If no ephemeris data are in memory, or if the data are older than ten hours, 30 to 60 seconds are needed to collect data. The DG14 synchronizes its clock to GPS time within six seconds of locking a satellite. After three or four satellites are locked and the almanac and ephemeris data are collected, the DG14 computes its first position. The DG14 continuously updates almanac, ephemeris, and position data in its battery-backed memory to help optimize satellite requisition and time to first fix when the unit is next powered on.

With the SBAS option installed, the DG14 tracks two geostationary SBAS satellites at a time and makes the ranging ephemeris and SBAS differential correction data messages available over ports A and B. The two SBAS satellites tracked are based on the mode of operation selected by the user. If the Automatic mode is selected, the DG14 automatically searches for and tracks the SBAS satellites in a predefined order. If Manual mode is selected, the DG14 searches for and tracks the SBAS satellites you selected. The search time for each satellite should not exceed one minute for a hot start and three minutes for a cold start.

At the next power-up, if the almanac and ephemeris data are available in battery-backed memory, and if the ephemeris data are less than ten hours old, the DG14 restricts its satellite search to those satellites that should be visible based on this information. Under these conditions, the DG14 on average recomputes position in 10 to 15 seconds (hot start). If the almanac and ephemeris data are available in battery-backed memory, but the ephemeris data are more than ten hours old, the DG14 needs 30 to 40 seconds on average to compute a position (warm start). If almanac and ephemeris data and a valid position are not available at power-up, the DG14 computes position in 60 to 90 seconds on average (cold start).

Parameter Settings and Status

On initial power-up or after issuing the **\$PASHS,RST** (restore defaults) command, the DG14 reverts to its default parameter settings. Enter the following three commands to query the DG14 for the current parameter status:

1. **\$PASHQ,PAR** (general parameters)

The response message for the query command **\$PASHQ,PAR** (general parameters) is shown below:

2. **\$PASHQ,RAW** (raw data parameters)

The command **\$PASHQ,RAW** is functional only if the Binary Data Outputs option (Option O) is installed in the receiver. An example of the response message for the default values of **\$PASHQ,RAW** (raw data parameters) is shown below:

Saving Parameter Settings

New parameter settings can be saved by issuing the set command, **\$PASHS,SAV,Y**. You can verify that new settings are in effect by issuing query commands to prompt the DG14 for its current status. After the next power-up, the query response messages display the new settings instead of the default parameters. Issue the command **\$PASHS,RST** to restore the default settings. If the SAV command is not entered, the new settings will be lost, and the default settings restored at the next power cycle.

Watchdog Timer

The DG14 has a watchdog timer. If the processor hangs up for any reason, the watchdog timer resets the receiver. On reset, the receiver uses the parameters most recently saved during the startup. If parameter settings were not saved, the receiver uses the default settings at startup.

CAUTION

User-entered parameters will be lost and default settings will be restored if the command **\$PASHS,SAV,Y** is not entered before the next power cycle.

Position and Navigation Modes

The DG14 can perform position computations and navigation solutions in several position modes and eight dynamic modes.

Position Modes (Least Squares Algorithm)

Use the **\$PASHS,PMD** command allows you to set the position mode. See “PMD: Position Mode” section on page 110 for more information.

- Position Mode 0
At least four satellites at elevations equal to or above the position elevation mask are needed to compute a position. The receiver stops computing positions if the number of satellites tracked falls below three. All three polar coordinates (latitude, longitude, altitude) are computed in this mode.
- Position Mode 1 (Default)
At least three satellites with elevation equal to or above the position elevation mask are needed to compute a position. Only the latitude and the longitude are computed if three satellites are locked and the altitude is held fixed. For more information on fixed altitude modes, see “Fixed Altitude Modes” on page 40. The receiver stops computing positions if the number of satellites tracked falls below three. All three polar coordinates are computed if more than three satellites are locked.
- Position Mode 2
At least three satellites with elevation equal to or above the position elevation mask are needed to compute a position. Only the latitude and the longitude are computed and altitude is always held fixed even if the receiver is tracking more than three satellites. The receiver stops computing positions if the number of satellites tracked falls below three.
- Position Mode 3
At least three satellites with elevation equal to or above the position elevation mask are needed to compute a position. Only the latitude and longitude are computed, and the altitude is held if only three satellites are locked. If more than three satellites are used and the HDOP is less than the specified HDOP mask, all three polar components are computed. If HDOP is higher than the specified HDOP mask, the DG14 automatically

goes into the altitude hold mode. The receiver stops computing positions if the number of satellites tracked falls below three.

DEFAULT SETTINGS
\$PASHS,PMD— Position Mode 1

Position Modes (Kalman Filter Algorithm)

The DG14 can operate in one of two position modes using the Kalman Filter Algorithm: 3D and 2D.

- Mode 0: 3D

3D mode is the standard and default mode of operation for the DG14. In 3D mode, four locked satellites are required to compute the initial position. After the initial fix, the DG14 can maintain operation regardless of the number of satellites tracked. When the number of tracked satellites drops to zero, the DG14 can maintain navigation operation depending on the Kalman filter prediction algorithm; this is the prediction mode. You can choose whether or not the DG14 operates in prediction mode. Position fixes obtained during the prediction mode are flagged “predicted” in GGA and other NMEA messages containing position information, regardless if the receiver is in stand-alone mode or differential mode.

In the **\$PASHS,KFP,PRI** command, you can set the maximum allowable length of time for the DG14 to operate in Prediction Mode (Prediction Interval). The default interval for prediction mode is 10 seconds. After the prediction mode has timed-out, the DG14 needs at least four satellites in 3-D mode, and 3 satellites in 2-D mode, to reset its Kalman filter and resume positioning using the reference altitude set in the **\$PASHS,FIX** command.

In addition, you can set the receiver to not compute a position if the number of satellites used in the solution is less than a set number using **\$PASHS,PMD** command.

If you have set the DG14 to Static KF mode and only 1 satellite is available, the position is still not considered predicted because Kalman filter, in this case, is nothing but sequential least squares. Altitude remains constant for the entire prediction interval.

If you set PMD to 1 or 3 (adaptive 2-D mode), the Kalman filter changes from 3-D to 2-D mode if the number of satellites drops below 4., and then the Kalman filter behaves as if PMD was set to 2. The Kalman filter does not reset when it changes from 2-D to 3-D mode.

The Kalman filter automatically resets when either the error mask is exceeded or if the prediction interval is longer than the set maximum interval value.

After the first set of four or more measurements is received after a total-satellite-outage period, the DG14:

- continues operation and uses the received measurements to update the running Kalman filter, if the Prediction Mode was ON
- resets the Kalman filter with the received measurements and resumes operation similar to a hot start.

- Mode 2: 2D

In 2D mode, the DG14 can only calculate latitude, longitude, and time; the altitude is held constant. Use the **\$PASHS,ALT** and **\$PASHS,FIX** commands to set the altitude.

When FIX is set to 1, the 2D altitude is the altitude entered using the **\$PASHS,ALT** command. When FIX is set to 0, the altitude is the most recently determined altitude, which can be either that entered using the **\$PASHS,ALT** command, or the altitude from the last computed height value computed when VDOP was less than VDOP mask.

The DG14 requires at least three satellites to be locked for the initial 2D position fix. After the initial fix, there is no required number of locked satellites. The DG14 continues to operate making use of the locked satellites, propagating its internal solution and reporting the predicted position until ERM or any other user set mask exceeds the set value.

You can use the **\$PASHS,KFP,ON** command to enable the Kalman filter for prediction. Position fixes obtained during the prediction mode are flagged “predicted” in GGA messages.

If you set PMD to 2 (continuous 2-D mode), the Kalman filter is only initialized with the reference altitude, for all the next epochs the Kalman filter updates the position in correspondence with the current dynamic model and the parameters for this model (maximum velocity and acceleration) for the vertical direction should be ten times less than nominally.

If you have set the DG14 to Static KF mode and only 1 satellite is available, the position is still not considered predicted because Kalman filter, in this case, is nothing but sequential least squares.

In the **\$PASHS,KFP,PRI** command, you can set the maximum allowable length of time for the DG14 to operate in Prediction Mode (Prediction Interval). The default for prediction mode is OFF and the default prediction interval is 10 seconds. After the prediction mode has timed-out, the DG14 needs at least four satellites to reset its Kalman filter and resume positioning.

In Prediction Mode, the calculation and output of all standard position and velocity components are maintained. The DG14 continues to operate in prediction mode until one of the user set masks exceeds its set limit; namely ERM and Prediction Interval.

Navigation Solutions

The DG-16 can compute a navigation solution using either a least-squares or Kalman filter method. Use the **\$PASHS,KFP,ON/OFF** command to select the navigation solution. Unless you set the DG14, the performance requirements shall apply equally, irrespective of the selected navigation solution.

The DG14 uses statistical testing algorithms to allow for fault detection and isolation in both least squares and Kalman filter modes. In Kalman filter, fault detection may be provided using standard f-test and w-test. You can select either a 2s (95%) or 3s (99%) threshold so that measurements with estimated errors outside this threshold are rejected. Upon exceeding such thresholds, the measurements are excluded from the navigation solution.

Anytime a mask parameter such as ERM or PDOP setting is exceeded, the receiver outputs an empty position message even though a position is computed by the receiver.

Dynamic Modes

You can specify the dynamic mode under for the receiver using the **\$PASHS,DYN,d1** command. The navigation solution uses expected dynamics for a given solution. Table 3.1 outlines the DG14 dynamics modes.

* Quasi-Static represents a static condition with some tolerance for slight movements within a decimeter or two. An example would be an antenna on a handheld pole or on the back of a person; obviously a person can try to be static but will inevitably move within a decimeter or two. This is unlike “Static” mode where the antenna is placed on a tripod or any other stationary structure with zero tolerance for actual movement.

*"Adaptive Dynamic adapts the filter dynamics settings to any of the modes 2 through 7 in real time allowing the switch from one mode to the other based on the witnessed behavior. Use one of the standard Adaptive filtering algorithms that monitor covariance behavior to determine dynamics model to use.

If you set the Dynamic mode to Static and enable the Kalman filter mode for the navigation solution (**\$PASHS,KFP,ON**), then the velocity values output by the receiver are always zero for both ground speed and vertical velocity.



If you want to determine the appropriate model for your application, choose the Adaptive Dynamic mode. If you select Mode 1 through 7, the DG14 will not accommodate the other dynamic modes. Adaptive Dynamic mode can never be static; under good, open sky, static conditions, the Kalman filter automatically changes to Quasi-Static mode.

Fixed Altitude Modes

Two modes define the altitude setting when the DG14 is in altitude hold mode. The **\$PASHS,FIX** set command can be used to select between these modes. See "FIX: Fixed Altitude Mode" section on page 86 for more information.

- Fixed Altitude Mode 0
The most recent altitude is used. This is either the altitude entered by using the **\$PASHS,ALT** set command or the one computed when four or more satellites are used in the position solution and the VDOP value is below the VDOP mask, whichever is most recent.
- Fixed Altitude Mode 1
Only the last altitude entered through the command **\$PASHS,ALT** is used in the position fix solution.

On initial power-up, or after issuing the **\$PASHS,INI** command (initialize memory) or **\$PASHS,RST** command (restore defaults), the antenna altitude is set to zero.

Point Positioning

The Point Positioning option improves the accuracy of a stand-alone absolute position of a stationary receiver from about 5 meters to less than one meter over a period of four hours, and can typically get down to the couple of meters level after ten hours. Point positioning uses an averaging technique to reduce the effects of Selective Availability (SA) and other fluctuating errors. You can set the Point Positioning mode with the \$PASHS,PPO command. See the “PPO: Point Positioning” section on page 115 for more details on this command.

Geoid Model

The DG14 uses the Ohio State University 91A geoid model (OSU91A). For more information on OSU91A, refer to the Ohio State University:

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Ionospheric Model

The DG14 can use ionospheric and tropospheric models in its position computations to compensate for errors caused by ionospheric and tropospheric delay when needed. This mode of operation is typically used to improve autonomous accuracy by minimizing the influence of the ionosphere and troposphere on the code phase of the GPS signal. When the DG14 is in differential mode (base or rover), ionospheric and tropospheric modeling is disabled because differential GPS already compensates for delays associated with the ionosphere and troposphere. When the receiver is in autonomous mode, ionospheric and tropospheric modeling is enabled.

The ionospheric model used by the DG14 is based on the model defined in ICD-GPS-200, Revision B. The tropospheric model is based on the Bean and Dutton model. For more information on ICD-GPS-200, refer to ARINC Research Corporation:

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Setting Antenna Position

When in Differential Base Mode, the DG14 uses an accurate antenna position (reference position) entered by the user to calculate range corrections by subtracting the measured range from the true range. Two commands can be used to enter the reference position:

\$PASHS,POS (position setting including latitude, longitude, altitude).

\$PASHS,ALT (antenna height setting).

NMEA Outputs

The DG14 can output a variety of NMEA messages and Ashtech-format NMEA-style messages. Standard NMEA messages are output as a string of ASCII characters delimited by commas, in compliance with NMEA 0183 Standards

(version 3.0). Ashtech-format NMEA-style messages are also output in a comma-delimited string of ASCII characters, but may deviate slightly from NMEA standards. For example, the maximum length of a standard NMEA message is eighty characters, but the length of some Ashtech-format messages goes beyond eighty characters.

Both NMEA messages and Ashtech-format NMEA-style messages begin with a dollar sign (\$) and end with a Carriage Return/Line Feed <CR><LF> delimiter.

Any combination of these messages can be output through either serial port at the same time, and you can even choose to send the same message to output through both ports. The output rate is determined by the **\$PASHS,NME,PER** command, and can be set to any value between 0.05 and 999 seconds depending upon the update rate option installed (20, 10, 5, 2 or 1 Hz). For more information see the Chapter 7, NMEA Commands.

The default setting for the output interval is one second. See Chapter 4, Command/Response Formats, for more information on NMEA messages and Ashtech-format NMEA-style messages.

DEFAULT SETTINGS

When enabled, output interval setting for NMEA messages and Ashtech-format NMEA-style messages is one second.

Raw Data Output (Optional)

The DG14 has an optional feature that allows you to output raw data (also called real-time data) through serial ports A, B, and C. Five different messages can be output:

- MBN: Contains measurement data for each locked satellite using the Ashtech Type 2 data structure.
- PBN: Contains position and velocity data.
- SNV: Contains satellite ephemeris data.
- SAL: Contains satellite almanac data in a proprietary format.
- MCA: Contains measurement data (same as MBN) for each locked satellite using the Ashtech Type 3 data structure

All raw data messages are in binary format. The transmission protocol remains the same: 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, and no parity bit. Any combination of messages can be output through any of the serial ports, and the same messages can be output through different ports at the same time. The output interval is determined by the **\$PASHS,RCI** command, and can be set to any rate between 0.05 and 999 seconds depending upon which option has been selected for the raw measurement update rate (20, 10, 5, 2, or 1 Hz). For more information on the

structure and content for all the above messages, see Chapter 6, Raw Data Commands.

DEFAULT SETTINGS
Output interval setting for raw data messages is 1 seconds.

Photogrammetry / Event Marking (Optional)

With the photogrammetry [E] option installed, the DG14 can measure and record events with high accuracy. The input signal is transmitted at TTL levels with 10 K Ω impedance. In order to measure an event time, a trigger signal must be sent to pin 27 on connector J301. This input can be driven with either a TTL signal or a switch that grounds the pin. The photogrammetry feature allows the event time to be output by using the **\$PASHS,NME,TTT** command.

Enabling the TTT message causes the TTT NMEA message to output in synchronization with either the rising or falling edge (selectable) of the triggering signal. The trigger signal can be set to the rising or falling edge using the **\$PASHS,PHE** command.

DEFAULT SETTINGS
TTT synchronization message output— synchronize with the rising edge of the trigger signal

The precision of the measured time is 50 nanoseconds (ns) in differential mode and 200 ns in stand-alone mode with SA off. This is based on GPS time, which is output as day number, hours, minutes, seconds, and fractional seconds to 6 digits past the decimal mark.

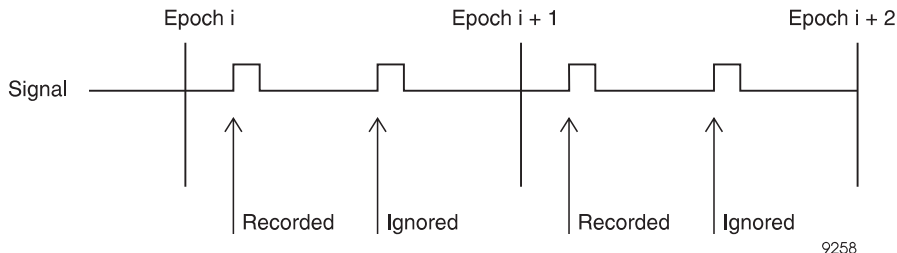


Figure 3.1. GPS Epochs

The photogrammetry time measures the event time relative to the receiver's GPS time. It measures only the first event during the period between 2 GPS epochs (Figure 3.1).

CAUTION

The DG14 measures only one event time per data collection period. If more than one event time is measured within a data collection period, the receiver measures only the first one. The event time record rate is dependent upon the setting of the RCI parameter.

Because the 1 PPS signal is used to measure the photogrammetry events, the period of the 1 PPS signal must be set to a value equal to or less than the period of the event pulse.

The trigger pulse may be TTL-compatible or open collector. Minimum pulse duration is 100 nanoseconds when the signal is not terminated at the receiver input. The impedance is approximately 5 K Ω .

Use a coaxial cable with BNC connectors to connect the camera trigger output to the photogrammetry input connector of the DG14.

Time Tagging the Shutter Signal

In this technique, the signal generated by the camera shutter is fed to a GPS receiver for accurate time-tagging which can then be post-processed with the GPS observations. Since the time of the picture is not synchronized with the time that the GPS measurement is taken, the two position computations before and after the shutter time are interpolated to compute the position of the camera at the time the picture was taken.

If GPS measurements are recorded at the rate of one per second, the average distance an aircraft travels in $\frac{1}{2}$ second is about 100 meters. Therefore, the distance between the position of the camera at the time the picture was taken and

the GPS position fixes can be as much as 50 meters. The motion of the aircraft during this time may be in the meter range.

To minimize the errors discussed above, the closed loop technique is recommended.

Closed-Loop Technique (Advanced Trigger)

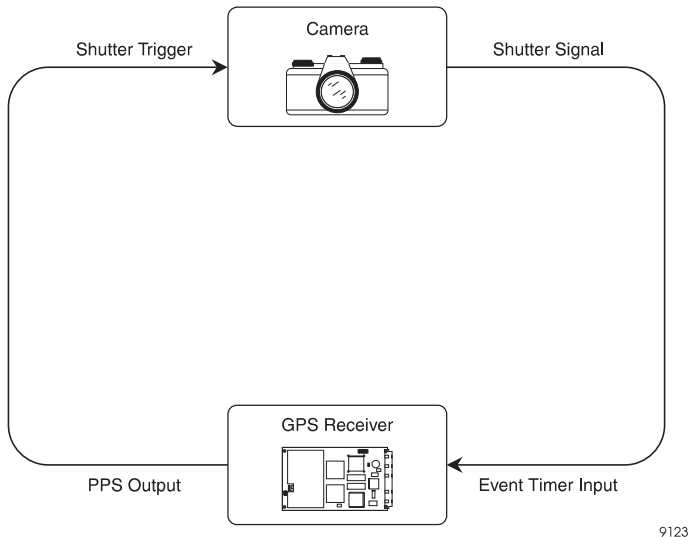


Figure 3.2. PPS Synchronization

The closed-loop technique combines PPS synchronization and shutter timing (Figure 3.2).

In this technique, the 1PPS output of the DG14 triggers a camera shutter. The camera shutter generates a signal that is fed to the DG14 for accurate time tagging, better than one microsecond.

The delay between the camera receiving the pulse and triggering the photogrammetry port should be calculated. This may then be applied so as to advance the 1PPS from the DG14 so that the shutter time exactly matches the GPS time for the epoch. No interpolation between the shutter time and the GPS position time will be needed.

Timing Pulse - Measurement Strobe (Optional)

When the timing pulse option [L] is installed, the DG14 can output a timing pulse synchronized with GPS time to an accuracy of ± 200 nanoseconds. The timing pulse is a TTL-compatible square wave signal output on pin 18 of the J301 connector and is fed into a 75-ohm impedance. The pulse is generated by default once every second (1PPS, or 1 pulse-per-second) with no offset from GPS time and with the rising edge of the pulse synchronized to GPS time. Using the **\$PASHS,PPS** command, the period of the pulse can be changed from 0.05 of a second up to 99.95 seconds, depending upon the receiver update rate, which, in turn, is dependent upon the installed position update rate and raw data update rate options. The timing pulse may be offset from GPS time within a range of -999.9999 to +999.9999 milliseconds. GPS time can be synchronized to the rising or falling edge of the square wave pulse.

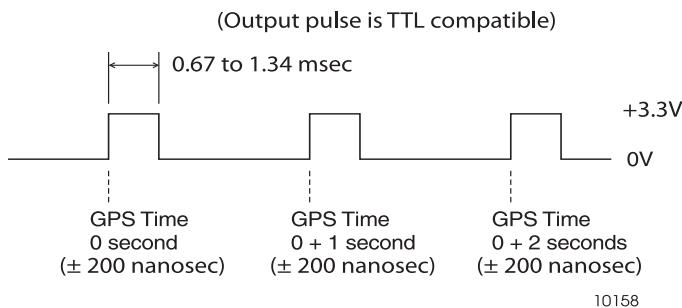


Figure 3.3. Timing Pulse Characteristics

Figure 3.3 shows timing pulse characteristics under default conditions. The pulse occurs when the TTL-compatible signal goes high. The TTL level compatibility is ensured with 500 ohms or greater impedance. The 1PPS output level when high is from +3.15 V to +3.45 V and in series with a 100-ohm resistor connected to the microcircuit output. The accuracy of 1PPS pulse is ± 200 nanoseconds (± 50 nanoseconds when in DGPS remote mode) to the GPS second and remains high for 0.67 to 1.34 milliseconds. The DG14 must be computing position and tracking a minimum of four satellites in order for the accuracy of ± 200 nanoseconds to be valid.

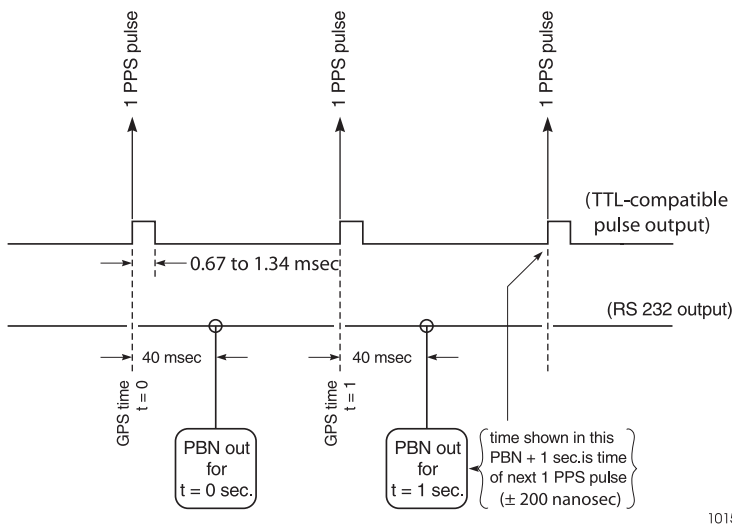


Figure 3.4. Relationship of GPS Time in PRN Record to Output of 1PPS Pulse

In order to provide notification to peripheral equipment and software with respect to time tagging the occurrence of the timing pulse, it is necessary to set the output of PBN raw data message to match the period of the timing pulse. The GPS time value contained in the PBN message plus one second is the time that the next pulse will occur when the default settings are in effect (Figure 3.4). PBN time is already internally rounded to GPS time, so it is the actual time to which the navigation 1PPS pulse generation which preceded it (unless that pulse has been intentionally advanced or retarded). The latency of PBN message output is normally about 7 to 20 milliseconds after the timing pulse event.

10 Hz and 20 Hz Outputs

The DG14 provides the optional capabilities of 10 Hz or 20 Hz internal update rates for position and raw data computations. When these options are installed, the DG14 can output NMEA messages and raw data messages at intervals of 0.1 or 0.05 seconds (see Table 1.8 for a list of the available options). During periods in which a 20 Hz update rate is not required, you can revert to a 10 Hz update rate by issuing the command **\$PASHS,RCI** for raw data and **\$PASHS,NME,PER** for NMEA messages.

CAUTION

When collecting data at 10 or 20 Hz, a 486-33 MHz or Pentium computer with a fast serial and parallel port card (i.e., 16550 serial and parallel card) is required because of large amounts of data being output through the serial ports. The serial port baud rate should be set to 115200.

Due to the Windows overhead, at 20Hz, data can be lost if too many messages are enabled or if outputting MCA message and tracking more than 9 satellites.



20 Hz option [W] is not available with Multi-base WADGPS option [M].

Jam Immunity

The DG14 provides jam immunity against in-band and out-of-band interferes.

For in-band interference, the DG14 can suppress in-band jamming signals while maintaining signal tracking, horizontal accuracy and acquisition time requirements. You can set the in-band jam immunity with the **\$PASHS,AJM,ON/OFF** command (default is OFF).

With AJM=ON you will lose approximately 2-3 dB of SNR on all satellites. This will only have a noticeable effect on weak satellite signals.

Datums

The receiver normally computes and outputs positions in the WGS-84 coordinate reference frame. However, it is possible to output positions in NMEA messages in a number of different pre-defined datums, as well as in a user-defined datum.

To set the receiver to output positions in a different datum, use the **\$PASHS,DTM** command. Once set to a different datum, then all position outputs in NMEA messages such as GGA and GLL and the position are referenced to the chosen

datum. For a list of Datums, see Table 5.15, “Predefined Datums and Associated Reference Ellipsoids,” on page 79.

If the list of datums does not include a datum of interest to the user, a user-defined datum may be created and supplied to the receiver. This is done using the command **\$PASHS,UDD** command along with the **\$PASHS,DTM** command. Prior to using these commands, the user must first define the required parameters including the length of the semi-major axis and amount of flattening in the reference ellipsoid, and the translation, rotation, and scale between the user-defined system and WGS-84.



After issuing the **\$PASHS,DTM,USR** command, the receiver internally transforms positions *from* the reference datum (WGS-84) *to* the user-defined datum. In standard text books, however, the datum transformations are given *from* local datums *to* WGS-84. To simplify entering the transformation parameters, the translation, rotation, and scale parameters are defined *from* the local datum *to* WGS-84.



To use this datum for the position computation and measurements, use the **\$PASHS,DTM,USR** command after defining the datum parameters.

The generic formula used to translate and rotate from coordinate system 1 to coordinate system 2 is as follows:

where $\varepsilon_{rx} = \varepsilon_x$ expressed in radians, similarly for ε_{ry} and ε_{rz} .

Example: Define local datum as the WGS-72 datum

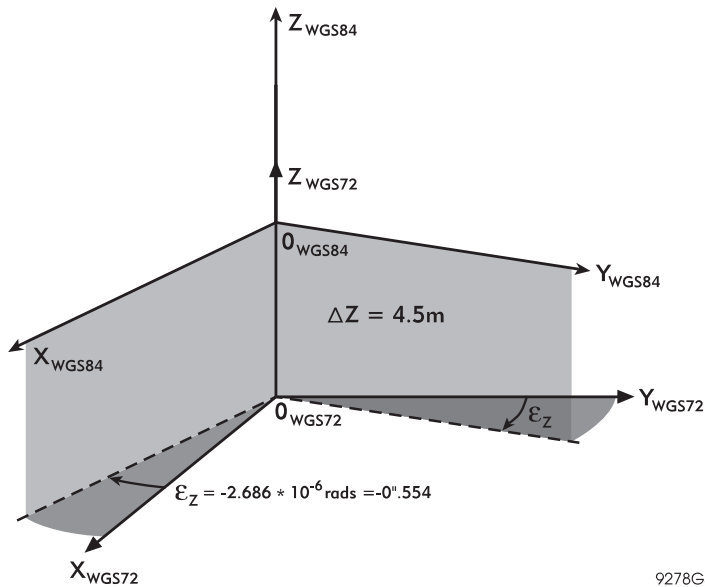


Figure 3.5. Rotation and Translation Between Coordinate Systems

Internally, the receiver implements the transformation *from* WGS-84 *to* WGS-72. Figure 3.5 demonstrates the change in the coordinate systems.

Coordinate Transformation

This chapter discusses the coordinate transformation features of your receiver.

Background

GPS determines the three-dimensional positions of surveyed points based on the WGS-84 datum. These coordinates are either presented as geocentric Cartesian coordinates (X,Y,Z) values or geodetic coordinates (latitude, longitude, ellipsoidal height).

There are circumstances where it would be desirable to have positions represented in a different reference frame or format, i.e. based on a different datum or projected onto a plane (grid coordinates).

The DG14 provides the following on-board tools to transform WGS-84 coordinates into various formats and reference frames:

1. Datum-to-Datum transformation
Using this feature, WGS-84 coordinates can be transformed into coordinates based on another datum.
2. Datum-to-Grid conversion
With this tool, a grid system can be defined to convert geodetic coordinates into grid coordinates.
3. Elevation Modeling
Using an on-board geoid model, ellipsoidal heights can be transformed into orthometric heights using this capability.

Table 4.1 provides an overview of user coordinate transformation functions for your receiver.

The remainder of this chapter describes in more detail the coordinate transformation features of your receiver.

Datum to Datum

The receiver normally computes and outputs positions in the WGS-84 coordinate reference frame. However, it is possible to output positions in NMEA messages in a number of different pre-defined datums, as well as in a user-defined datum.

To set the receiver to output positions in a different datum, use the **\$PASHS,DTM** command. Once set to a different datum, then all position outputs in NMEA messages such as GGA and GLL are referenced to the chosen datum. For a list of Datums, see Table 5.15, “Predefined Datums and Associated Reference Ellipsoids,” on page 79.

If the list of datums does not include a datum of interest to you, you can define a datum and load it on the receiver, using the **\$PASHS,UDD** command along with the **\$PASHS,DTM** command. Prior to using these commands, define the required parameters including the length of the semi-major axis and amount of flattening in the reference ellipsoid, and the translation, rotation, and scale between the user-defined system and WGS-84.

The generic formula used to translate and rotate from coordinate system 1 to coordinate system 2 is as follows:

$$\begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{bmatrix}_2 = \begin{bmatrix} \Delta x \\ \Delta y \\ \Delta z \end{bmatrix} + (1 + m \times 10^{-6}) \begin{bmatrix} 1 & \epsilon_{rz} & -\epsilon_{ry} \\ -\epsilon_{rz} & 1 & \epsilon_{rx} \\ \epsilon_{ry} & -\epsilon_{rx} & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{bmatrix}_1$$

where $\epsilon_{rx} = e_x$ expressed in radians, similarly for ϵ_{ry} and ϵ_{rz} .

Example: Define local datum as the WGS-72 datum

Send the following commands to the receiver:

\$PASHS,UDD, 0,6378135.0, 298.26,0,0,4.5,0,0,-0.554,0.23

\$PASHS,DTM,UDD

This implements the transformations listed in Table 4.2 and below.

After issuing the **\$PASHS,DTM,UDD** command, the receiver internally transforms positions **from** the reference datum (WGS-84) **to** the user-defined datum. In standard text books, however, the datum transformations are given **from** local datums **to** WGS-84. To simplify entering the transformation parameters, the translation, rotation, and scale parameters are defined **from** the local datum **to** WGS-84.

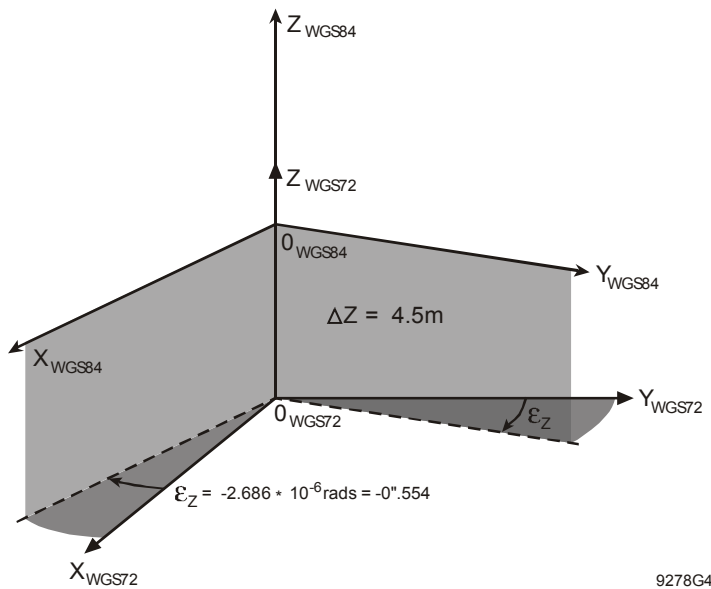


Figure 4.1. Rotation and Translation Between Coordinate Systems

Figure 4.1 illustrates the change in the coordinate systems.

After transforming the datum, the receiver computes geodetic coordinates in the defined system. All coordinates output by the receiver are in this new system.



Do not forget to issue the \$PASHS,DTM,UDD command after defining the transformation parameters with the \$PASHS,UDD command. Otherwise, the newly entered parameters are not used.

Datum to Grid

Use this transformation to generate coordinates in an <x,y> rectangular system, based on the user's location and mapping requirements or local standard. The user may select any projection along with any base datum for output.

Convert geodetic coordinates into grid coordinates by defining a grid system utilizing one of the supported projection types (Figures 5.2 - 5.6).

CAUTION

Although almost any projection or combination of datums and projections is mathematically possible, some are inappropriate with respect to the project scope or geographic area.

To set the receiver to supply grid coordinates:

1. Select the projection type that best fits your needs.
2. Define the grid system, using this projection type, with the **\$PASHS,UDG** command. This command defines the grid system to be used.
3. Enable the grid system with the **\$PASHS,GRD,UDG** command. The receiver computes grid coordinates in the system defined.
4. To access the grid coordinates, use either the **\$PASHQ,GDC** command to query for one output of the current coordinates, or use the **\$PASHS,NME,GDC** command to set the receiver to continuously output the current coordinates.

There is one exception when configuring the receiver to compute and output grid coordinates. If you are interested in computing and outputting WGS-84 based UTM coordinates, there is no need to define the grid system in the receiver. The parameters for WGS-84 UTM are pre-set in the receiver. To use them, set the receiver to output grid coordinates using either the **\$PASHQ,UTM** command to query for one output of the current coordinates, or the **\$PASHS,NME,UTM** command to set the receiver to continuously output the current coordinates.



Check the GDC message for the currently assigned datum.

Projection Types

The following graphics represent the different types of projections available for the receiver.

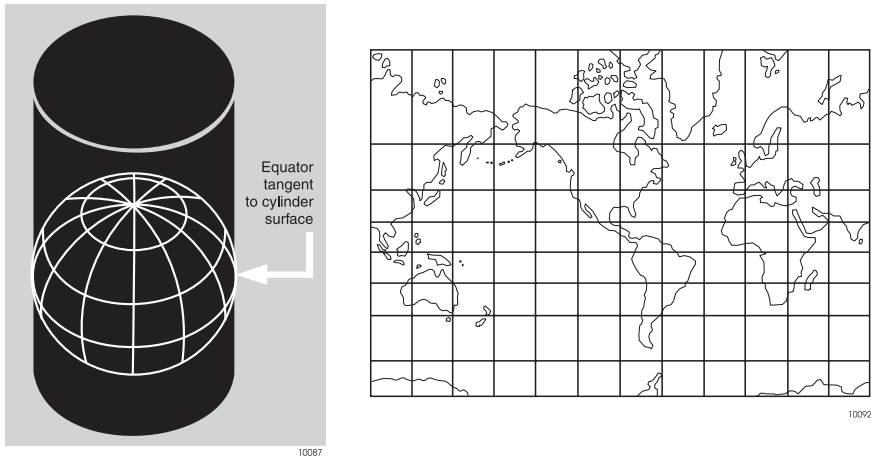


Figure 4.2. Mercator

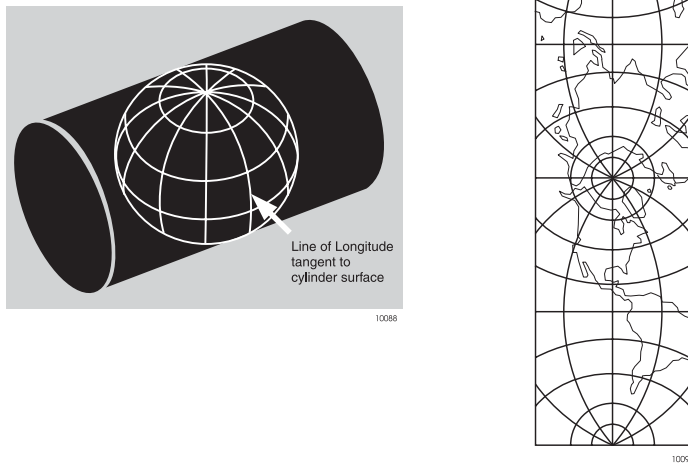


Figure 4.3. Transverse Mercator

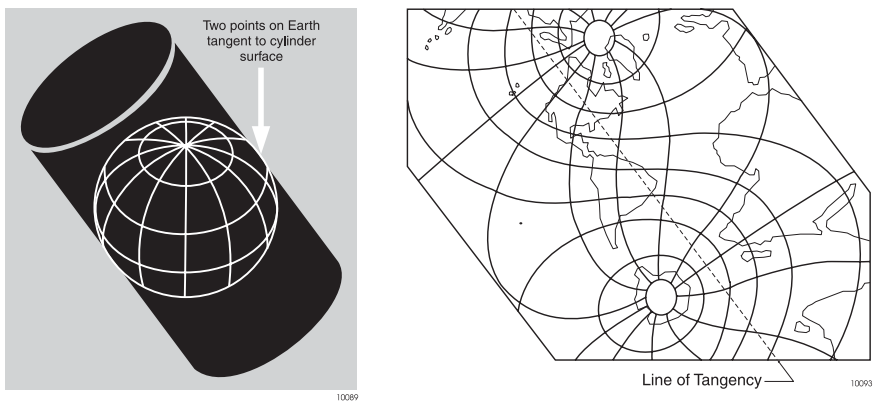


Figure 4.4. Oblique Mercator

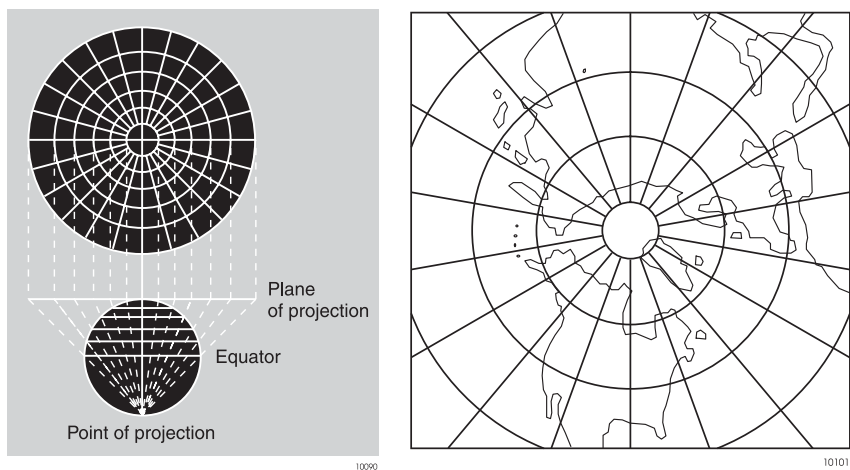


Figure 4.5. Stereographic

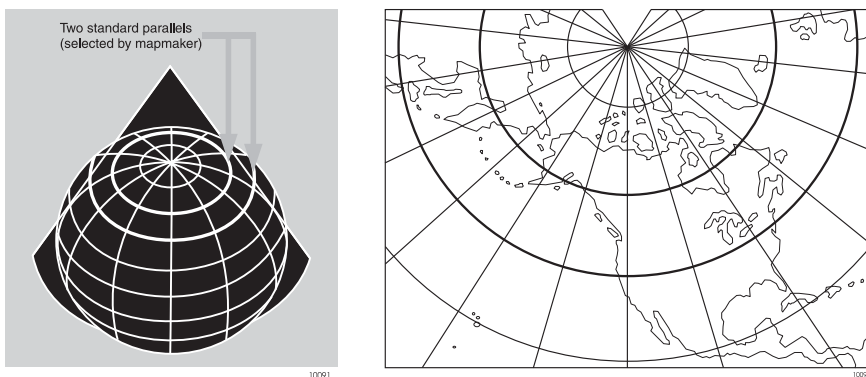


Figure 4.6. Lambert Conformal Conic

Elevation Modeling

In addition to computing and outputting geodetic and cartesian coordinates in different systems, the receiver can compute and output elevations in different systems.

By default, the receiver computes and outputs ellipsoidal heights. In some messages, the geoid separation is included, computed from the internal global model, relative to WGS-84.

To set the receiver to compute and output orthometric heights, use the **\$PASHS,HGT,GEO** command. After setting this command, the receiver outputs orthometric heights using the internal global geoid model. Be aware that the internal geoid model used in this calculation is very coarse. Orthometric heights derived from this model could be in error by a meter or more.



If separation is included in the message, it is calculated by adding the difference between WGS-84 and a user- or pre-defined datum to the WGS-84-based geoid separation. An exception to this is the GGA message which **ONLY** outputs WGS-84 based geoid heights and separation, as per NMEA specifications.

Receiver Commands

Chapters 6 through 9 cover the formats and content of the serial port commands through which the DG14 receiver is controlled and monitored. These serial port commands set receiver parameters and request receiver status information and other data. Use Evaluate™ software or any standard serial communication software to communicate with the receiver. Note that the baud rate and protocol of the computer COM port must match the baud rate and protocol of the receiver port for commands and responses to be successfully transmitted and received. The communication protocol is 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, and no parity.

All messages sent by the user to the receiver are either “Set” command messages or “Query” command messages. Set commands generally change receiver parameters and initiate data output. Query commands generally request receiver status information. All set commands begin with the string **\$PASHS**; all query commands begin with **\$PASHQ**. **\$PASHS** and **\$PASHQ** are the message headers. They are required for all set or query commands. All commands must end with an **<Enter>** or **<CR><LF>** (Carriage Return/Line Feed) keystroke in order to send the command to the receiver. If desired, an optional checksum may precede the **<Enter>** characters. All response messages also end with **<Enter>** or **<CR><LF>** characters. Please note that some messages are functional only if the appropriate option is installed.

When a command is sent to one of its serial ports, the DG14 responds by outputting a message indicating the acceptance or rejection of the command. In the case of query commands, the DG14 either outputs a response message containing data relevant to the query or sends a “NAK” response, indicating that the query command was invalid. All DG14 response messages begin with the string **\$PASHR**, including status messages that are set for output at regular intervals from either of the DG14’s serial ports.

DG14 serial port commands fall into seven groups:

- Receiver commands— discussed in Chapter 6
- Raw data commands— discussed in Chapter 7
- NMEA message commands— discussed in Chapter 8
- Differential commands— discussed in Chapter 9
- RTCM commands— discussed in Chapter 9
- SBAS commands— discussed in Chapter 9
- Beacon commands— discussed in Chapter 9

The following chapters discuss each type of command. Within each section, the commands are listed alphabetically and described in detail. A description of the command, the command structure, the range and default states of command parameters, and an example of how a given command is used are presented for each command. These parameters may be either characters or numbers depending upon the command. Table 5.1 lists the symbols and the types of data represented by them used to illustrate message structures in the ASCII format:

If you have the User-defined messaging option installed [X], you can use the \$PASHS,UDM command to view receiver information you specify the DG14 to output. See Appendix B, **UDM Utility** for more information on setting up a user-defined message.

Receiver Commands

Receiver commands allow you to change or query the status of various operating parameters such as elevation mask, antenna altitude, position mode, etc. In this context, set commands are used to change the DG14's operating parameters. Query commands prompt the DG14 to output status messages for parameter settings and receiver operation.

If an invalid set or query command is issued, a "not acknowledged" (NAK) response is output:

\$PASHR,NAK*30

Set command messages can be sent through serial port. When the DG14 receives a valid set command message, it returns an "acknowledged" (ACK) message:

\$PASHR,ACK*3D

The DG14 returns a NAK message if the command is invalid. For example, the set command **\$PASHS,SAV,Y<Enter>** instructs the DG14 to save user-entered operation parameters; the DG14 returns **\$PASHR,ACK*3D** to acknowledge that the command was valid and the instruction was carried out. The set command **\$PASHS,SAV<Enter>** is incomplete, and would cause the DG14 to flag it as an invalid command by responding with a "not acknowledged" response:

\$PASHR,NAK*30.

The set command message structure is as follows:

"Header,Command ID,<Command Parameters>*Checksum<Enter>"

The header field always contains **\$PASHS**. The command identifier field contains a three character string and is followed by the command parameters. The checksum is strictly optional. All set commands are terminated with an **<Enter>** or **<CR><LF>** keystroke. All command string elements between the dollar sign (\$) and the asterisk (*), including the command parameters, are comma delimited; that is, the header, the ID string, and the individual command parameters are separated by commas. Enter the following set command to set the HDOP mask value:

\$PASHS,HDP,6<Enter>

Query commands are used to request current GPS information and receiver status information such as baud rate settings, position information, and tracking information. Query command messages can be sent to either of the DG14's serial ports. Most query commands allow you to designate the port from which the response message is sent. The DG14 acknowledges a valid query command message by sending the requested response message through the specified port. If the port is not specified in the query command, the response is sent from the same port which received the query. The requested information is sent once each time the command is issued and is not repeated.

The query command message format is as follows:

\$PASHQ,xxx,<optional query parameter>*hh<Enter>

Table 5.2 contains descriptions of the query command elements.

The query command **\$PASHQ,CRR** instructs the DG14 to output a response message indicating the currently selected code correlation mode:

\$PASHR,CRR,E*5E

The query command **\$PASHQ,CR<Enter>** is incomplete, and causes the DG14 to flag it as an invalid message by outputting the NAK response.

Table 5.3 contains a list of the set and query commands falling into the category of receiver commands. The commands are listed alphabetically by function, and then alphabetically within each function. The commands are described in detail in the pages following Table 5.3.

This command queries the antenna height entered into the receiver, where c is the optional port designator for the output of the response. If a port is not specified, the receiver sends the response to the current port.

Query antenna offsets to port A.

\$PASHR,ANH,f

where f is the antenna height in meters.

* Quasi-Static represents a static condition with some tolerance for slight movements within a decimeter or two. An example would be an antenna on a handheld pole or on the back of a person; obviously a person can try to be static but will inevitably move within a decimeter or two. This is unlike “Static” mode where the antenna is placed on a tripod or any other stationery structure with zero tolerance for actual movement.

**Adaptive Dynamic adapts the filter dynamics settings to any of the modes 2 through 7 in real time allowing the switch from one mode to the other based on the witnessed behavior. Use one of the standard Adaptive filtering algorithms that monitor covariance behavior to determine dynamics model to use.



If you are unsure which is the appropriate model for your application, choose the Adaptive Dynamic mode. If you select Mode 1 through 7, the DG14 will not accommodate the other dynamic modes.

EPG: Kinematic Epoch Counter

The 99% position error estimate is three times the standard deviation values reported in the GST message. Current ERM settings appear in the **\$PASHQ,PAR** message.

The various ERM mask parameters are utilized based on the positioning mode the receiver is operating in. For example, in auto-differential mode (AUT,ON), based on the epoch-to-epoch conditions, the receiver will use the respective mask parameters based on the corresponding positioning mode of each epoch. If the receiver is generating autonomous positions (e.g. due to the lack of current RTCM correction) the AUT mask parameters will be used until differential position fixes are computed, which will be masked by the DIF parameters.



The horizontal position standard deviation is derived from the individual latitude and longitude standard deviations (GST) every epoch.

Example

Enter the following command to set the error masks for autonomous mode to five meters for horizontal measurements and ten meters for vertical measurements:

This command enables or disables the usage of the user-defined datum to grid transformation to position outputs, where s1 is either NON (transformation disabled) or UDG (enable user-defined datum to grid transformation). The GRD command is used in conjunction with the **\$PASHS,UDG** command, which is used to select the desired datum to grid transformation parameters.

The receiver will not acknowledge the command if the entered and computed position differ by more than 500 meters.

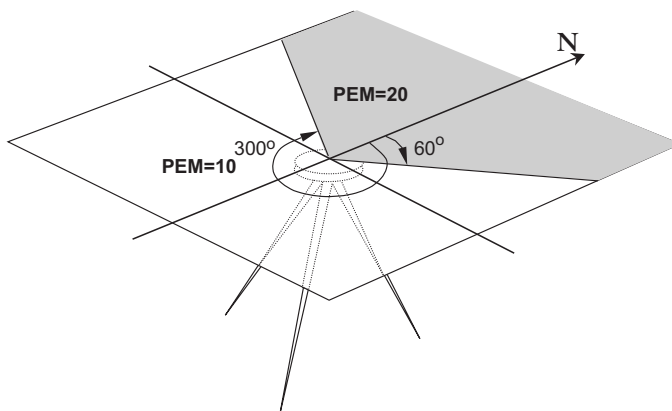


Figure 5.1. SEM Mask Zone

SMI: Code Measurement Smoothing

$\varepsilon_{rx} = \varepsilon_x$ expressed in radians (this also applies to ε_{ry} and ε_{rz}).

To clarify the datum transformation process, create a user-defined datum using parameters from the WGS-72 datum. Table 5.67 contains ellipsoid parameters for the WGS-84 datum and the WGS-72 datum:

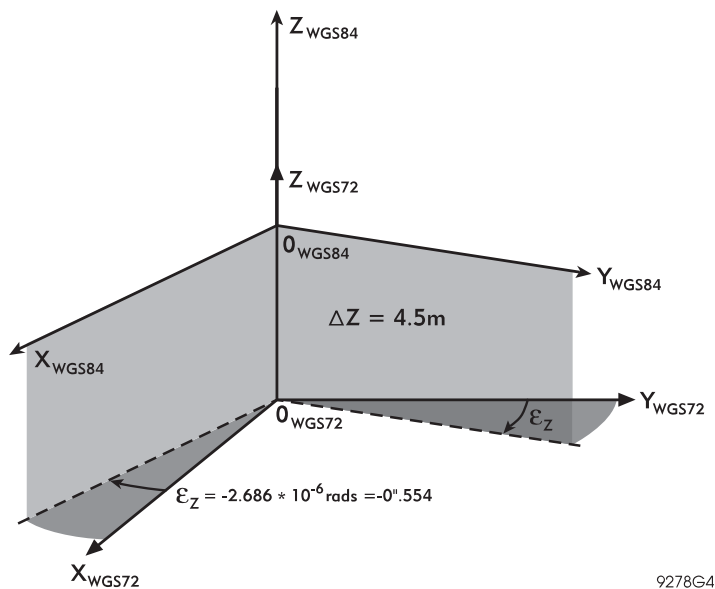


Figure 5.2. Rotation & Translation Between WGS-72 & WGS-84

The DG14 performs an internal coordinate transformation *from* WGS-84 *to* WGS-72 so that geodetic position messages can be output in the desired coordinates as dictated by the parameters specified in the UDD command. Figure 5.2 illustrates the translation and rotation that occur in the WGS-84 to WGS-72 transformation.

UDH: Geoidal Surface in a Local Area

The general format for the set commands controlling the output of raw messages is as follows:

\$PASHS,RAW,s1,c1,s2,[f1]

In this context, set commands are used to enable the output of raw data messages at regular intervals or to disable output of raw messages, where s1 is a three character message identifier (SNV, MBN, PBN, etc.), c1 is the port designator for message output, s2 is ON or OFF, and f1 is the optional numeric output interval setting supporting a range of 0.05 to 999 seconds, depending on the measurement update rate option installed.



If the output is set without a period, f1, and the period set by the \$PASHS,RCI command is issued after individual RAW message output periods have been set, all individual message periods will be reset to the RCI output period setting.

Query commands prompt the receiver to output the corresponding response message once only. Message output prompted by a query command occurs independently of any related message output settings.

To enable the output of the MBN message on port A at five second intervals, enter the following command:

\$PASHS,RAW,MBN,A,ON,5

To disable the output of the MBN message on port B, enter the following command:

\$PASHS,RAW,MBN,B,OFF

To query for the MBN message and designate port B for the output of the response message, enter the following command:

\$PASHQ,MBN,B

As with the other query commands, the port designator (B) is optional. If a port is not specified, the receiver sends the response to the current port.

Message Structure

Real-time messages are output in binary format:

HEADER, MESSAGE ID, DATA + CHECKSUM<CR><LF>

The header field always contains **\$PASHR**. The message identifier field contains the three-character message identifier (**MBN, PBN, SAL, etc.**) and is followed by a field containing the binary data string. The header, identifier, and data string fields are comma delimited. Depending on the message selected, the checksum is contained in the last one or two bytes of the binary data string. All real-time messages are terminated with a Carriage Return/Line Feed <CR><LF> delimiter.

The MBN message is output:

\$PASHR,MPC,<Binary Data String + Checksum><CR><LF>

The general format for the set command to enable or disable output of raw data messages is **\$PASHS,RAW,s1,c1,s2** where s1 is the three-character message identifier, c1 is the port designator, and s2 is ON or OFF. The port designator is a required parameter in enabling or disabling the output of raw data messages.

Checksum

There are three different algorithms used in the checksum calculation, one for text messages and two for binary messages:

- Text Messages:
 - The hexadecimal checksum is computed by exclusive-ORing all of the bytes in the message between, but not including, the \$ and the *. The result is *hh where h is a hex character.
- Binary Messages:
 - The checksum for all binary messages except MCA is computed by breaking the structure into 20 unsigned shorts, adding them together, and taking the least significant 16 bits of the result.
 - The checksum for the MCA message is computed by a bitwise exclusive OR (XOR) of all bytes from sequence tag (just after header) to the byte before the checksum.



All bytes are in MC6800 order: most significant byte first (IBM PC uses Intel order: least significant byte first).

CMB: Channel Measure Block

`$PASHS,RAW,CMB,c1,s2,[f1]`

This command enables or disables the channel measure block (CMB) message, where c1 is port A, B or C (optional port), s2 is ON or OFF, and f1 is the optional numeric output interval setting supporting a range of 0.05 to 999 seconds, depending on the measurement update rate option installed.

`$PASHQ,CMB,[c1]`

This command queries for the CMB message.

c1 is the optional port designator for the response. If a port is not specified, the receiver sends the response to the current port.

`$PASHR,CMB`

The message is output in the format:

`$PASHR,CMB,<structure>`

ELM: Elevation Mask for Raw Measurements Outputs

\$PASHS,ELM,d1

This command sets the minimum elevation for the output of raw measurement data (CT1, MBN, MCA, etc.), where d1 is a number between 0 and 90. The receiver can be set to output raw measurement data for each satellite it is tracking that is above the elevation mask. It stops outputting raw measurement data for any satellite (GPS and/or SBAS) at or below the elevation mask. If the elevation mask is set to 10°, the receiver outputs raw measurement data for all tracked satellites with an elevation of 11° or higher, but not output raw measurement data for any tracked satellites with an elevation of 10° or lower. You can view the current raw data elevation mask setting \$PASHQ,RAW and checking the ELM field.



The ELM command sets the elevation mask for both GPS and SBAS satellites.

MCM: Missile Application Condensed Measurement Record (MACM)

This message optimizes the data output and data transmission in high dynamic applications requiring high speed data output with communications bandwidth limitations.

MACM Message Structure

This message is not output unless positions are being computed. MCM is a combined message containing elements from the MBN, MCA, and PBN messages. The MCM message was designed for high speed data output under the limited bandwidth conditions common to high dynamic telemetry. Satellite PRN number, receive time (the time at which the data was received), doppler measurements, pseudo-range measurements, and full carrier phase measurements are contained in this message. The MCM message is variable in length, defined by the count field in the header. The message begins with a 4-byte sync word [4D 41 43 4D] (ASCII "MACM") and ends with a checksum byte. The **<CR><LF>** characters that terminate the majority of DG14 response messages are not used in this case. In addition, the usual response header, \$PASHR, is not used here. If the receiver is set to output the MCM message at regular intervals, the MACM sync word appears only the first time the message is output and is excluded from the messages that follow; however, the sync word is output each time MCM is queried. The following is the output for one epoch. The syntax for each parameter is listed in brackets as [parameter name:number of bytes for parameter]. At the right of each line is an identifier and byte count.

The DG14 is designed to synchronize raw message output with the hour rollover, so that message output from multiple receivers can be synchronized regardless of when they were turned on.



Almanac data for all satellites is output once every hour, with one almanac message output for each satellite in the constellation. The almanac messages are output at interval prescribed by the \$PASHS,RCI command.



At the 10 Hz output rate (0.1 seconds), a baud rate of 115,000 bps is required to output all the raw data (MBN, PBN, SNV, and SAL). For greater output rates, the raw data must be split between the two serial ports, or some of the messages should be turned off. To receive data at high baud rates (e.g., 115,000), you must ensure that your computer has a suitable serial I/O capability. Most newer computers with Pentium or 486 processors have good enough serial communication to support high data rates.

SNW: SBAS Ephemeris Data

This command enables or disables the SBAS ephemeris data on port s1, where c1 is port A, B or C (optional port), s2 is ON or OFF.

The DG14 outputs the ephemeris data each time the IOD changes (at a maximum of 2 minutes) with data for one satellite at each recording interval.

NMEA Commands

NMEA commands allow you to set parameters for outputting NMEA messages and Ashtech format NMEA-style messages. These commands can be sent to the DG14 through either serial port. Table 7.1 lists the set and query commands used in controlling NMEA message output. All NMEA messages and Ashtech format NMEA-style messages are disabled for output by default.

The general format for the set commands used to control the NMEA message output is as follows:

\$PASHS,NME,s1,c2,s3,[f4]

In this context, set commands are used to enable the output of NMEA messages at regular intervals or to disable message output, where s1 is a three character message identifier (GGA, VTG, SAT, etc.). c1 is the port designator (A or B) for message output. s3 is ON or OFF. f4 is the optional message output rate ranging from 0.05 to 999 seconds depending on the measurement update rate option installed.

If the command is set without a period, the DG14 uses the period set by the **\$PASHS,NME,PER** command. If the **\$PASHS,NME,PER** command is issued after this message period has been set, the period resets to the PER setting.

Query commands prompt the receiver to output the corresponding response message once only. Message output prompted by a query command occurs independently of any related message output settings.

To enable the output of the POS message on port A at five second intervals, enter the following command:

\$PASHS,NME,POS,A,ON,5

To disable the output of the GGA message on port B, enter the following command:

\$PASHS,NME,GGA,B,OFF

To query for the POS message and designate port B for the output of the response message, enter the following command:

\$PASHQ,POS,B

As with the other query commands, the port designator (B) is optional. If a port is not specified, the receiver sends the response to the current port.

Message Structure

Standard NMEA messages are output as a string of ASCII characters delimited by commas, in compliance with NMEA 0183 Standards (version 3.0). Ashtech format NMEA-style messages are also output in a comma-delimited string of ASCII characters, but may deviate slightly from NMEA standards. For example, the maximum length of a standard NMEA message is eighty characters, but the length of some Ashtech format messages are variable (i.e., SAT) and may go beyond eighty characters. Both NMEA messages and Ashtech format NMEA-style messages begin with a dollar sign (\$) and end with a Carriage Return/Line Feed <CR><LF> delimiter. Any combination of these messages can be output through different ports at the same time. The output rate can be set to any value between 0.05 and 999 seconds. The default output interval is one second.

Standard NMEA messages have the following structure:

```
HEADER, DATA*CHECKSUM<CR><LF>
```

The comma after the header is followed by the ASCII data string and the message checksum. The checksum is separated from the data string by an asterisk. Both standard and non-standard NMEA messages use a dollar sign (\$) to indicate the beginning of a message, and both types are terminated with a <CR><LF> delimiter. GGA, which is a standard NMEA message:

```
$GPGGA, DATA*CHECKSUM<CR><LF>
```

The structure of non-standard NMEA messages:

```
HEADER, MESSAGE ID, DATA*CHECKSUM<CR><LF>
```

Standard NMEA messages include the message identifier in the header. Non-standard messages, which have an Ashtech format, have the message identifier in a separate field. SAT, a non-standard message:

```
$PASHR, SAT, DATA*CHECKSUM<CR><LF>
```

The data types that appear in NMEA messages can be integers, real numbers (decimal), hexadecimal numbers, alphabetic characters, and alphanumeric character strings.



Data items are separated by commas; successive commas indicate data not available. Two successive commas indicate one missing data item; three successive commas indicate two missing items.



See the *NMEA 0183 Standard for Interfacing Marine Electronic Navigational Devices* for more details on protocols and message formats.

NME: Enable/Disable All NMEA Messages

`$PASHS,NME,ALL,x,OFF`

Disable ALL NMEA message types on port x, where x is the output port.

Example

Enter the following command to disable all NMEA messages for Port A.

`$PASHS,NME,ALL,A,OFF <Enter>`

Enter the following command to disable all NMEA messages for Port B.

`$PASHS,NME,ALL,B,OFF <Enter>`



You must enter both of the above commands to disable the output of all messages from both ports.

At 10 Hz output rate, a baud rate of 115,000 bps is required to output all the NMEA messages. At greater output rates, the raw data must be split between the two serial ports, or some of the messages should be turned off. To receive data at high baud rates (e.g., 115,000), ensure that the computer has a suitable serial I/O capability. Most newer computers with Pentium or 486 processors have good enough serial communication to support high data rates.

AIM Command

The `$PASHS,AIM` command is used to enable/disable the RAIM feature and also to select a pre-defined or user-set alarm limit.

The [I] option is needed to use this command. If the RAIM option is not installed, then the AIM command will have no effect.

Format: `$PASHS,AIM,s<CR><LF>`

Where s is:

OFF - Disables RAIM. In this case, the FDE algorithm is turned OFF but HPL is still computed.

NPA - Non-precision approach, alarm limit is 0.030 NM

TER - Terminal, alarm limit is 1.00 NM

ERT - En route, alarm limit is 2.00 NM

x.x - User-defined alarm limit, x.x can be any value between 0.015 and 1000.00 NM.

The RAIM setting currently used by the receiver should be indicated in the response to `$PASHQ,PAR`. The default RAIM setting is OFF. The RAIM setting should be kept in BBU memory along with other settings.

AIM Message

\$PASHS,NME,AIM

This command allows you to enable or disable the RAIM message.

Format

\$PASHS,NME,AIM,x,s<CR><LF>

Where:

Parameter	Description
x	Identifier of the serial port through which the RAIM message will be output: A - Port A B - Port B C - Port C
s	Output control: ON - Enables RAIM message to be output OFF - Disables RAIM message

Return Message

After you send the \$PASHS,NME,AIM command, one of the following two messages will be returned, depending on whether the command could be processed or not:

\$PASHR,ACK*3D: The command was successfully processed

\$PASHR,NAK*30: The command failed.

Note

If the output is set without a period, the period set by the \$PASHS,NME,PER command is used. If a \$PASHS,NME,PER command is sent after individual NMEA message output periods were set, the previous individual message period is superseded by the latest NME,PER value.

Example

The following command will enable the RAIM message on port B:

\$PASHS,NME,AIM,B,ON

\$PASHQ,AIM

This command allows you to output the RAIM message.

Format

\$PASHQ,AIM,[c]<CR><LF>

More about the RAIM value

If $d1=0$ in the RAIM message, this means none of the detected errors exceeds the alarm limit. All computed satellite ranges are used in the position velocity calculation.

If $d1=1$, RAIM has detected errors, has excluded satellites with large range errors and corrected the position and velocity. If the number of channel-satellite pairs is not greater than 1, the corrected position and velocities are acceptable for applications requiring 0.999 probability. If the number of channel-satellite pairs is greater than 1, there is no assurance that the positions and velocities have been properly corrected. However, in many cases, RAIM corrects the results satisfactorily, even in adverse conditions.

If $d1=2$, RAIM has detected a problem but cannot eliminate the questionable satellites because of too few satellites (e.g. 5 satellites in view). In this case, the computed data (position and velocity) does not meet the 0.999 probability.

If $d1=3$, the satellite geometry is poor and detection is unavailable. This value is returned whenever the number of satellites is less than 5.

Finally, if $d1=4$, RAIM indicates that errors do exist (the message contains channel-satellite pairs), but it fails to correct positions and velocities. In such cases, you can exclude questionable satellites by using the \$PASHS,USE or \$PASHS,SVS commands.

When RAIM rejects a satellite from the position solution, the satellite should be marked with the letter "R" in SAT messages when SUI=ON.

ALM: Almanac Message

\$PASHS,NME,ALM,c,s

This command enables or disables the almanac message where c is the receiver serial port (A, B, or C) and s is ON or OFF.

Example

Enter the following command to enable ALM message on port C

\$PASHS,NME,ALM,C,ON

\$PASHQ,ALM,c

Query the almanac message, where c is the optional output port.

\$GPALM

There is one response message for each satellite in the GPS constellation. The length of the message is calculated by the characters, in halves of bytes, not full bytes. The response to the set or query command is in the form:

XMG: Exception Messages

This command enables or disables the exception messages or port x, where x is the output port, c is ON or OFF, and f is the optional message output rate ranging from 0.05 to 999 seconds depending on the measurement update rate option installed.

The DG14 does not output this message unless it computes a position.

If the command is set without a period, the DG14 uses the period set by the **\$PASHS,NME,PER** command. If the **\$PASHS,NME,PER** command is issued after this message period has been set, the period resets to the PER setting.

Example

Enter the following command to enable XMG message on port B.

\$PASHS,NME,XMG,B,ON

\$PASHQ,XMG,[c1]

This command queries the exception messages, where c1 is the optional port designator for the output of the response. If a port is not specified, the receiver sends the response to the current port.

\$PASHR,XMG, d1,d2

The response is in the format \$PASHR,XMG, d1,d2 where d1 is the exception number and d2 is a description of the exception message. Table 7.58 describes the exception numbers.

The DG14 does not output this message unless it computes a position.

If the command is set without a period, the DG14 uses the period set by the **\$PASHS,NME,PER** command. If the **\$PASHS,NME,PER** command is issued after this message period has been set, the period resets to the PER setting.

Example

Enter the following command to disable ZDA message on port A.

\$PASHS,NME,ZDA,A,OFF

\$PASHQ,ZDA,[c1]

This command queries the ZDA message, where c1 is the optional port designator for the output of the response. If a port is not specified, the receiver sends the response to the current port.

\$GPZDA

This message is not output until the receiver has locked on at least one satellite. The ZDA message contains UTC time, the current date, and offset values for converting UTC time to local time. The message is output in the format:

\$GPZDA,m1,d2,d3,d4,d5,d6*hh

Differential Operation

The DG14 can operate as either a Remote Station or Base Station for differential GPS, and it can be set to operate as a combined base and remote station. The DG14 also makes use of multiple correction data streams and offers a multi-base differential solution.

This chapter contains a general discussion of real-time differential operation, including available options, basic concepts, sources of error, DG14 commands related to differential GPS. Differential remote [U] and base [B] operation are available as receiver options. Both options must be installed in order for the DG14 to be able to support both differential modes (base and rover).

General

Real-time differential positioning involves a reference (base) station calculating range corrections for each satellite it is tracking and transmitting them to the remote (rover) stations through a real-time data communications link. Remote receivers apply the corrections to their own range measurements and use the corrected ranges to compute positions.

The base receiver determines range correction by subtracting the measured range from the true range. A precise reference position must be entered in the base receiver before true range can be calculated.



RTCM type 1 corrections with a UDRE (User Differential Range Error) field set to 3 (one-sigma differential error > 8 meters) are not used.

As a stand-alone receiver, the DG14 can compute a position with ± 3 meter CEP (Circular Error Probable) of accuracy (on average) with Selective Availability (SA) off. Autonomous accuracy worsens to an average of ± 100

meters with SA on. In differential mode, a DG14 in rover mode can achieve sub-meter accuracy.

Real-time differential operation requires a communication link between the base and rover receivers. A wireless link, such as a radio-modem link or cellular/modem link is typically used, although any other medium that can transfer digital data can be used.

Sources of Error

The major sources of error affecting the accuracy of GPS range measurements are satellite orbit estimation, satellite clock estimation, ionosphere, troposphere, multipath, and receiver noise in measuring range. The first four sources of error are almost totally removed by differential corrections. The residual error is in the order of one millimeter for every kilometer of separation between base and remote receivers.

Receiver noise is not correlated between the base and the remote receiver and is not canceled by differential GPS. However, in the DG14, integrated doppler measurements are used to smooth the range measurements and reduce the errors resulting from receiver noise.

At the instant an satellite is locked, there is also RMS noise affecting the range measurement. RMS noise is reduced over time by the square root of the number of measurements computed by the receiver. For example, after 100 seconds of locking to a satellite, the rms noise in range measurement is reduced by a factor of 10 (one meter of noise is reduced to 0.1 meter). The noise is further reduced with each additional measurement.

If the lock to a satellite is lost, the noise goes back to one meter and smoothing starts from the one-meter level. The loss of lock to a satellite is rare, and typically happens only when the DG14 antenna's line of sight to the satellite is blocked by an object, or when the satellite goes below the horizon.

Total position error (or error-in-position) is a function of the range errors (or errors-in-range) multiplied by the PDOP (three-coordinate position dilution of precision). PDOP is a function of satellite geometry; that is, the positions of the satellites in relation to one another.

RTCM Messages

The DG14 accepts differential correction messages in the RTCM format (refer to *RTCM Recommended Standards for Differential GNSS*, version 3.0). The DG14 can be set to output or receive RTCM messages using either of its two ports by issuing the set command **\$PASHS,RTC,s1,c2** where s1 is either BAS (base station mode) or REM (remote mode) and c2 is the port designator for the input or output of differential corrections. The DG14

supports six out of the 64 different types of RTCM messages. Message type 3 contains base station status information. Message type 16 contains a special ASCII message of up to 90 characters. Type 16 messages are used to communicate special information. For example, a base station operator may wish to construct a message informing users that the base station will go offline temporarily in order to perform routine maintenance or repairs. Message types 1, 2, and 9 contain data used for position correction. The type 6 message is a null frame message which is used to establish and maintain RTCM message frame synchronization for remote differential stations. RTCM messages are processed automatically by the DG14. Although RTCM messages are output in binary format, it is possible to convert them to ASCII format through the **\$PASHS,NME,MSG** set command and the **\$PASHQ,MSG** query command.

All RTCM messages except type 1 are generated by the base station only if they are enabled using the **\$PASHS,RTC,TYP** set command. In addition, if type 1 or type 9 messages are enabled and a change of ephemeris occurs in one or more satellites, the base station automatically generates a type 2 message with the delta IODE (Issue of Data, Ephemeris) information. The type 2 message is generated regardless of whether the type 2 message has been enabled for output. When a DG14 set in differential remote mode receives a type 2 message, and the IODE information in type 1 or 9 messages does not match, the remote receiver uses the delta ephemeris information in the received type 2 message until the IODE information in the incoming type 1 or 9 messages matches the IODE information in the received type 2 message.

On initial power-up, or after issuing the **\$PASHS,RST** command (restore defaults), the DG14's setting for differential mode is OFF, and the setting for the maximum age of an RTCM differential correction is 60 seconds, meaning that an incoming correction whose age is greater than 60 seconds is not used. If automatic differential GPS mode is not enabled (**\$PASHS,DIF,AUT**), and if the differential correction data is unavailable or is older than the maximum age specified by the **\$PASHS,RTC,MAX** set command, a DG14 set as a remote differential station will not output position data. If automatic differential mode is enabled, a DG14 set as a remote differential station will output uncorrected positions if differential correction data is unavailable or if the age of correction exceeds the maximum age setting.

RTCM 104 Format, Version 3.0

When the RTCM base option is enabled and the DG14 is configured as a reference station, it computes differential corrections for up to 12 satellites, converts those corrections to RTCM format and outputs the converted messages through its serial ports. The DG14 generates message types 1, 2,

3, 6, 9, and 16, listed in Table 8.1:

The DG14 uses the six-of-eight format (data bits a1 through a6 of an eight-bit byte) for differential corrections.

When the RTCM remote option [U] is installed and the DG14 is set in differential remote mode, it can decode RTCM message types 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, and 16, but uses only types 1, 2, and 9 to correct its position calculations. When using radio-modems for the communication link, the DG14 in remote mode is able to recover bit slippage.

Base Station

You can configure the DG14 as an RTCM Base (Reference) Station, and can enable or disable differential-correction message output from the receiver. When enabled, the DG14 sends message types 1, 2, and 9 continuously and can send either type 3 or type 16 individually. If type 1 or type 9 messages have been enabled and the ephemeris changes in one or more satellites, the base station automatically generates a type 2 message with the delta IODE information. This automatic type 2 message generates independently of the setting for type 2 messages.

For all messages, you can set the period and internal bit rate of correction transmission using the **\$PASHS,RTC,TYP** and **\$PASHS,RTC,SPD** commands. You can control the delay for switching to the new IODE using the **\$PASHS,RTC,IOD** command.

The DG14 computes differential corrections for up to 12 GPS satellites, can compute differential corrections for up to two SBAS satellites, and can make use of SBAS integrity information. The DG14 can also output RTCM corrections based on SBAS satellite correction data.

The DG14 can output differential corrections in either RTCM SC-104 or RTCA DO-217 format via a serial port. The DG14 uses the six-of-eight format (data bits a1 through a6 of an eight-bit byte) for communication between the reference station and user equipment.



RTCM recommends that you use of a highly stable clock with the Type 9 implementation to prevent degradation of navigation accuracy due to clock drift that can occur between Type 9 messages. Since the DG14 does not support an external frequency input, be aware of possible degradation in positioning using Type 9 instead of Type 1 corrections.

Setting Up a Differential Base Station

You must have the Base option [B] installed on the receiver.

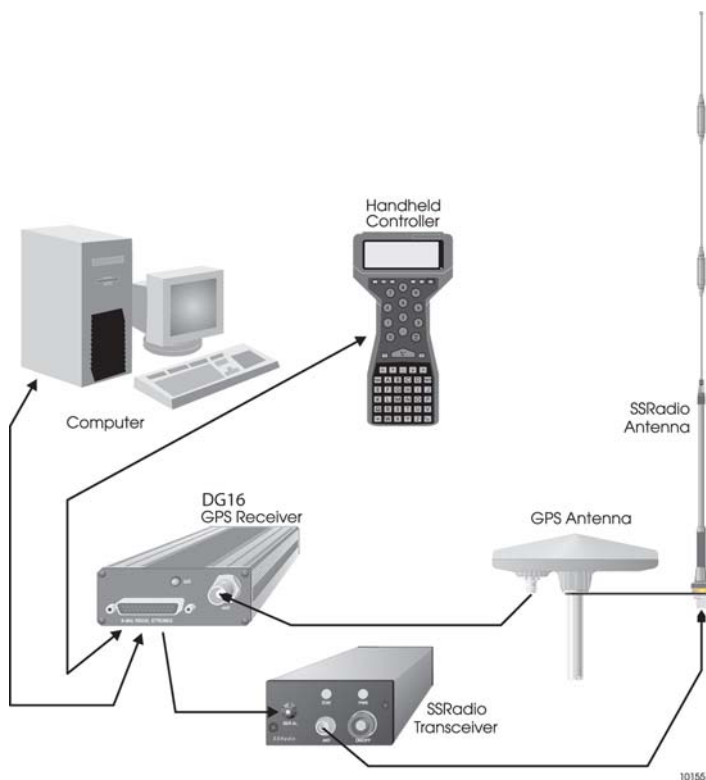


Figure 8.1. RTCM Base Station System

Figure 8.1 displays a typical DGPS base station configuration.

CAUTION

Errors in the base station reference position will be duplicated in positions computed by the remote system.

Send the commands listed in Table 8.2 to the receiver to generate RTCM differential corrections using message type 1.

The receiver is set as a base station which transmits RTCM message type 1 every second. Following a power cycle it automatically starts transmitting these corrections again (because you have saved the settings with the **\$PASHS,SAV,Y** command). To change the message rate, use the **\$PASHS,RTC,TYP** command.

Moving Base Operation

The DG14 will function as a moving base station. In Differential Base mode, the DG14 can continuously input real-time reference position updates (at a rate of 1Hz or less) to the operating remote station using **\$PASHS,POS** command. The DG14 remote station accepts and utilizes the entered reference position in less than 100ms. The remote receiver must receive continuously transmitted corrections to update the reference position.

Advanced Settings for Differential Base Stations

There are many parameters that control the operation of the receiver. Most should be left at default values, except for the settings identified in Table 8.2.

Antenna

Locate the antenna with a clear view of the sky.

The antenna position, entered with the **\$PASHS,POS** command, is the WGS-84 phase center of the antenna. The relative accuracy of the remote receiver positions is the same, with respect to the base station, as if you had entered the true position of the antenna. The absolute accuracy translates by the difference between the nominal base station position and the true WGS-84 position. That is, if the nominal base station position is one meter north of the true position, then all remote positions are translated north by one meter. You may check which position was set by using the **\$PASHQ,RTC** command.

Message Rate

To improve Differential performance, minimize base station data latency by using the highest possible data rates that your data link supports. There are three different settings that affect data rates:

- RTCM message bit rate. **\$PASHS,RTC,SPD**. This is the internal bit rate used to generate the RTCM messages. This should be as high as possible without exceeding the baud rate of the serial port.
- Serial port baud rate. This should be as high as possible.
- RTCM message rate. This is the rate at which messages are generated.
- Differential messages (Type 1) are next most important, ideally once per second. If the data rate does not support this, these messages may be generated slower, with a corresponding decrease in differential accuracy.

Base Station Position

The RTCM message 3 broadcast the base station position.

Base Station Antenna Offset

If you set up the base station antenna over a known, surveyed point, you may enter the position of the surveyed point and the offset from this point to the antenna phase center. Or you may enter the phase center directly.

If you are using Type 3:

- At the base station, enter the phase center of the antenna directly using **\$PASHS,POS** or
- At the base station, enter the surveyed reference point using **\$PASHS,POS** and enter the antenna offset using **\$PASHS,ANT**.

Using Reference Station ID

You may monitor which reference or base station the remote receiver uses by setting a reference station ID at the base station. Set the reference station ID using the command **\$PASHS,RTC,STI**.

You may also control which reference station the remote receiver uses by setting the desired station ID at the remote receiver, or all the remote receiver to use corrections from any base station.

Reference Station Health

You may set the reference station to unhealthy, which causes all remote receivers to ignore the messages they receive from that base station.

Other RTCM Messages

Partial Differential corrections: Message 9

These are alternatives to messages 1. They should only be used if you have a low bandwidth data link (~100bps). Use of high-bandwidth data links, and messages 1 are recommended.

Message type 1 cannot generate at the same time as type 9.

Message 2

These are automatically generated when the base station is transmitting differential corrections and a new ephemeris is downloaded from the satellites.

Filler: Message 6 Null Frame

This message is provided for data links that require continuous transmission of data, even if there are no corrections to send.

Special Message: Message 16

This message allows you to transmit an ASCII message from the base station.

Using a PC Interface

If you are using the Thales Evaluate™ software to interface to your receiver you may use initialization files (*.gps) to send the base station setting commands for you.

To monitor the corrections from a PC, turn on the MSG message

\$PASHS,NME,MSG,y,ON

This generates an ASCII representation of the RTCM messages transmitted by the base station and decoded by the rover. Use different receiver serial ports for MSG and the actual transmitted RTCM messages.

Remote Station

The DG14 can accept differential corrections from a SBAS satellite, through the beacon receiver, and/or through a serial port input. You can select the set of corrections you want to use in the navigation solution (Integrated Differential Optimization or a single type of correction data).

The DG14 validate all received differential corrections including the checksum and parity validation checks included in the RTCM and SBAS specifications, and uses only the valid correction data in the navigation solution.

When in DGPS operation and using RTCM corrections, the DG14 supports

the Type 2 message for IODE changes.

A differential navigation solution is only computed when there is a sufficient number of matched sets of satellite parameters and corrections. The DG14 will never calculate a partial differential solution. If there are enough corrected satellites to compute a position even though not all tracked satellites have corrections, the navigation solution disregards uncorrected measurement data and/or unused corrections and includes only corrected measurement data in the computation. When a navigation solution is computed using the least-squares algorithm, the measurement data and corrections data for a given satellite must both be available for the particular epoch. Satellites with propagated measurement data and valid corrections data are included in a differential navigation solution generated with the Kalman filter. Regardless of the navigation algorithm, the number of satellites required to produce a valid solution depends on the position mode: at least four satellites for a 3D solution, and at least three satellites for a 2D solution.

The DG14 conducts validity tests on incoming RTCM messages before incorporating them into the navigation solution.

Setting Up a Differential Remote with External Corrections

You must have the Differential remote option **[U]** installed on your receiver.

Figure 8.1 displays a typical DGPS remote station configuration

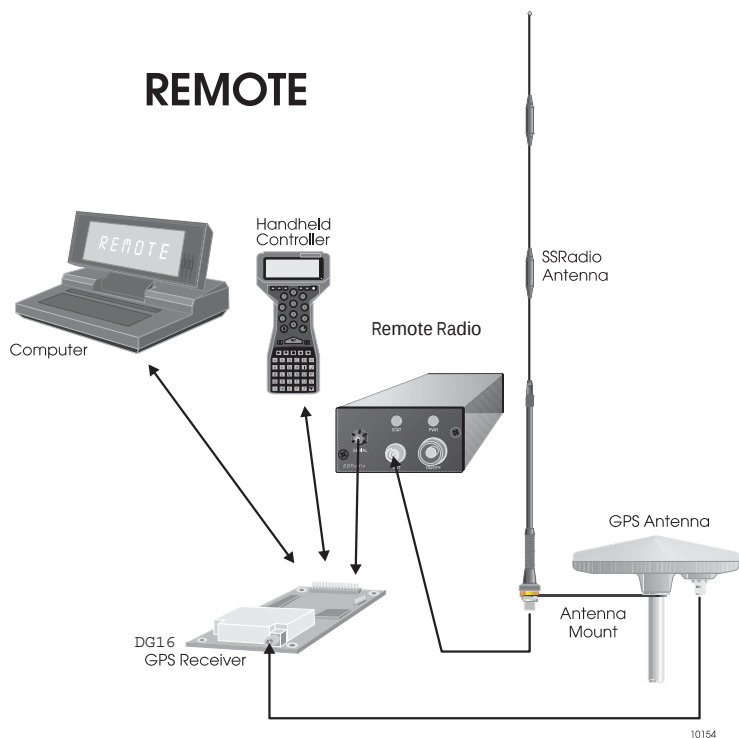


Figure 8.2. RTCM Remote System

You must have a source of differential corrections. In the DG14, the user has a choice of corrections from the on-board beacon receiver, SBAS corrections, or corrections from an external source. In this example, we connect a radio to one of the DG14 serial ports.

Send the following commands to the receiver. The receiver will accept RTCM differential corrections in message types 1 or 9. You do not have to tell the receiver which message types to expect, it will automatically use whatever it receives on serial port x.

You have now set up the remote station. Turn on the GGA, GLL, or POS message to obtain position.

Recommended Settings for Differential Remote Stations

There are many parameters that control the operation of the receiver. Most should be left at default values. The following settings are recommended for differential remote stations.

\$PASHS,CRR,S

\$PASHS,LPS,10,3,1 (for high dynamic or high vibration applications)

Other parameter settings at factory default.

Base Data Latency

Differential operation works better the lower the latency of the base-remote data link. To minimize latency set the baud rate of the radios as high as possible, and use radios that are optimized for low latency GPS operation, such as the Thales SSRadio.

The actual base-remote data latency is given in the GGA message.

Maximum acceptable base-remote data latency is controlled by the **\$PASHS,RTC,MAX** command.

Automatic Differential Mode

When you are using a rover receiver in differential mode (either code phase or carrier phase), a failure at the base station or in the data link causes the rover receiver to cease outputting differentially corrected positions. You can use the auto differential mode to output an autonomous position at the rover receiver if differential data from

the base station is unavailable. Enabled the auto differential mode with the **\$PASHS,RTC,AUT,Y** command. Table 8.4 describes how auto differential mode affects position output at the rover receiver.

SBAS Operation

The DG14 can track two geostationary SBAS satellites at a time and make ranging, ephemeris, and SBAS differential correction data messages available through the serial ports. In addition, the DG14 can process SBAS corrections for DGPS positioning and also provide the corrections for output through the serial ports in RTCM SC-104 format.

The DG14 has several modes of SBAS operation:

- Automatic Mode—the receiver determines which SBAS satellite(s) to use
 - Single Automatic Mode
 - Dual Automatic Mode
- Manual Mode—you manually set which SBAS satellite(s) to use
 - Single Manual Mode
 - Dual Manual Mode

The default SBAS mode is Single.

Automatic Modes of Operation

In Automatic mode, the DG14 automatically searches for and tracks the SBAS satellite listed in the available almanac. If no SBAS almanac is available, the DG14 searches for and tracks the SBAS satellites in a predefined re-programmable order: satellites 35, 33, 47, 51, 34, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 48, 49, 50. Use the **\$PASHS,SBA,SSO** command to set a different search order.

NOTE: The SBAS PRN numbers range from 120 to 138. The offset from SBAS SVID to SBAS PRN numbers is 87. Add 87 to the SVID to derive the SBAS PRN number.

Single Automatic Mode

In Single Automatic SBAS mode, the DG14 automatically detects all available SBAS signals and selects the best ONE satellite, switching automatically as you move from one coverage area to another. The automatic selection uses both SBAS channels. Channel 1 tracks the best available SBAS signal and Channel 2 scans for another available SBAS satellite signals, maintaining a SBAS satellite directory in a battery-backed memory. The quality of the SBAS satellite tracked on Channel 1 (signal strength, elevation, etc.) is continuously compared to the quality threshold. When the quality of the signal on Channel 1 is less than the quality threshold, the DG14 checks the quality of the signal of the Channel 2 satellite. If Channel 2 satellite has a better signal, the DG14 switches to it. If, on the other hand, the signal on Channel 1 drops below the threshold and the signal on Channel 2 is no better or any SBAS satellite, the DG14 continues to use and track the satellite on Channel 1.

Use the **\$PASHS,SBA,SAM** command to set the receiver in Single Automatic mode to track SBAS satellites and use the data in the navigation solution.



The best SBAS satellite is determined based collectively on the satellite SNR, elevation angle, continuity of signal reception, etc.

Dual Automatic Mode

In Dual Automatic SBAS mode the DG14 automatically detects all available SBAS signals and selects the best two satellites. Channel 1 tracks the best satellite available, and Channel 2 tracks the second-best available satellite. In this mode, the DG14 has no capability to continue to scan for other, better SBAS signals. Therefore, once selected, the DG14 continues to track these two selected SBAS satellites so long it is able. If the signal on one of the channels is lost, the DG14 scans the available frequencies to find another SBAS satellite.

Use the **\$PASHS,SBA,DAM** command to set the receiver in Dual Automatic mode to track two SBAS satellites and use the data in the navigation solution.



The best SBAS satellite is determined based collectively on the satellite SNR, elevation angle, continuity of signal reception, etc.

Manual Modes of Operation

In Manual SBAS mode, the DG14 searches for and tracks the SBAS satellite(s) you specify. You can specify either one or two SBAS satellites for either Single Manual Mode or Dual Manual Mode.

Single Manual Mode

In Single Manual SBAS mode, the DG14 searches for and tracks the specified SBAS satellite (PRN = xx) on Channel 1. Channel 2 automatically searches for and tracks the best available SBAS signal. Use the **\$PASHS,SBA,MAN,xx** to enable the Single Manual SBAS mode and use the SBAS data in the navigation solution.

Dual Manual Mode

In Dual Manual SBAS Mode, the DG14 searches for and tracks the two specified SBAS satellites (PRN = xx and PRN=yy) on Channel 1 and Channel 2, respectively. Use the **\$PASHS,SBA,MAN,xx,yy** to enable the Dual Manual SBAS mode and use the SBAS data in the navigation solution.



DGPS Positioning Using SBAS Corrections

The DG14 can decode, process, and apply SBAS differential corrections received from the SBAS channels.

Use SBAS message types 6, 8 and 10 to determine and report the quality of the corrections/solution (e.g. in the GST message). If message type 10 is not available, then the corresponding error component is set to a NOMINAL VALUE.

Use the **\$PASHS,RTC,SLC,SBA** command to enable the SBAS corrected position with all available SBAS correction components. If you do not want a differential position output with partial corrections of the SBAS messages, use the **\$PASHS,SBA,PAR,OFF** command.

On cold start, the first solution is corrected with all components but the ionosphere and then the subsequent position fixes are corrected with all components.

Utilizing SBAS Channel Data

In any of the above SBAS modes of operation, you can select one of three data utilization options:

1. Use Channel 1 data only: **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU,CH1**
2. Use Channel 1 data when available, and Channel 2 data only as backup: **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU,BCP**
3. Use data from both Channels simultaneously: **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU,BTH**



Modes 2 and 3 only work in either manual or automatic dual mode of operation.

The default is **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU,BTH**— use data from both Channels simultaneously.

Using SBAS Data

You can choose from up to five options to specify how to use the SBAS channel data:

1. Decode and output
2. SBAS-to-RTCM conversion and output
3. Utilization of SBAS corrections in DGPS solution and SBAS-to-RTCM conversion and output
4. Integrity information utilization
5. Ranging signal utilization in navigation solution

Decoding and Outputting SBAS Data

If the SBAS option is enabled and if the SBAS mode is activated, you can set the DG14 to decode and output SBAS data using the **\$PASHS,SBA,DAT** command. The number of SBAS channels used for the decoding and outputting SBAS data depends on the **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU** settings.

Converting SBAS Correction to RTCM SC-104

The SBAS corrections are converted to RTCM SC-104 format for output. The RTCM corrections are optimized for the current DG14 location. The generated RTCM corrections include RTCM message types 1, 2, 3, 6, and 9. Message Type 3 contains the current Reference Position of the receiver, if in BASE mode, or the current GPS/DGPS position of the receiver, if in stand-alone or REMOTE mode.

Use the **\$PASHS,SBA,RTC** command to convert the SBAS corrections to RTCM SC-104. See **\$PASHS,SBA,RTC** on page 320 for more information.

The number of SBAS channels used for the conversion depends on the **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU** setting.



Utilizing SBAS Corrections in DGPS Solution

The full SBAS set of corrections include:

- fast corrections—Satellite clock corrections
- long term or slow corrections—Satellite ephemeris and long term satellite clock corrections
- ionosphere corrections

Use the **\$PASHS,RTC,SLC,SBA** and **\$PASHS,RTC,REM,ON** commands to utilize SBAS corrections in the DGPS solution.

SBAS message types 6, 8 and 10 are not used in position computation using SBAS corrections. These messages help determine and report the quality of the corrections/solution, but do not to allow or disallow position computation.

Use the **\$PASHS,SBA,PAR,OFF** command if you do not want a differential position output without the whole of correction set of fast, slow, and iono components. The default is ON: partial corrections are allowed.

After a cold start, the first solution is corrected with all components but the ionosphere and subsequent position fixes are corrected with all components.



The number of SBAS channels used for the utilization of SBAS corrections depends on the **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU** setting.

Utilizing Integrity Information

You can use the **\$PASHS,SBA,INT,ON/OFF** command to enable or disable the integrity information available. The default is ON.



The number of SBAS channels used as a source of integrity information depends on the **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU** setting.

Ranging signal utilization in navigation solution

This function will be available to the user by means of **\$PASHS,USP,SBA,Y/N** command. Default is Y.

SBAS ranging information shall be available in BOTH MCA and MBN format so the SBAS satellite can be used seamlessly in the navigation solution by raw data users.



The number of SBAS channels used for ranging information depends on the **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU** setting.

Saving SBAS Settings

You can save any SBAS parameters you set using the **\$PASHS,SAV,Y**

command.

Beacon Operation

The DG14 two-channel scanning beacon receiver has two modes of operation: automatic or fixed. In both modes, the beacon receiver can provide corrections from one or two beacon stations.

The DG14 beacon receiver outputs in RTCM SC-104 differential correction format.

The DG14 has several modes of beacon operation. Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,MOD** command to set the beacon operation mode:

- Automatic Mode—the receiver determines which beacon station(s) to use
 - Single Automatic Mode
 - Dual Automatic Mode
- Manual Mode—you manually set which beacon station(s) to use
 - Single Manual Mode
 - Dual Manual Mode

The default Beacon mode is Single Automatic. On power up, the DG14 remembers the last beacon stations used, and begins searching with those frequencies.

Automatic Modes

In Automatic mode, the beacon receiver automatically determines the MSK bit rate(s), and it utilizes its own position information in conjunction with a Beacon Station Location Table (stored in memory) to identify the nearest beacon stations and begin searching for these stations. On power up, the beacon receiver remembers the last used beacon ID's and begin searching for these frequencies.

You can view the default beacon directory using the **\$PASHQ,BCN,DIR** command. The beacon directory in the receiver is similar to, but usually larger than, the beacon almanac received in RTCM Type 7. The receiver beacon directory is updated by both RTCM Type 7 and what you add manually with the **\$PASHS,BCN,DIR,ADD** command. The last received record (RTCM Type 7 or user entry) overrides any preceding entries. Therefore, to avoid overwriting your entries with RTCM type 7 update information, disable RTCM Type 7 processing using the **\$PASHS,BCN,RT7,N** command.

A beacon station is identified by latitude, longitude, range, frequency, health, Station ID, bit rate, Modulation code, Sync type, and Broadcast Coding.

In Automatic Mode, you can mark a frequency to “never be used” using the

\$PASHS,BCN,NVR command.

Single Automatic Mode

In Single Automatic Mode, the beacon receiver automatically detects all available radio beacon signals and select the best one station, switching automatically as the user moves from one coverage area to another. Channel 1 tracks the best available beacon signal and sends the demodulated DGPS corrections to the DG14 receiver. Channel 2 scans for other available DGPS beacon signals, maintaining a DGPS beacon directory in a battery-backed memory. The beacon almanac/directory is automatically saved.

The quality of the beacon signal tracked on Channel 1 (signal strength, etc.) is continuously compared to a quality threshold. When the quality of the signal on Channel 1 is worse than the quality threshold, the beacon receiver checks the quality of the signal on Channel 2. If Channel 2 signal is better than Channel 1, the beacon receiver switches to it. If, on the other hand, the signal on Channel 1 drops below the threshold and the signal on Channel 2 is no better or no beacon signal is available, the DG14 continues to use and track the beacon signal on Channel 1.

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,MOD,AUT,SNG** command to set the DG14 to operate in Single Automatic Mode.

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,OUT** command to output the demodulated Beacon data from Channel 1 to the serial port.



The best beacon signal is determined based collectively on the SNR, continuity of signal reception, etc.

Dual Automatic Mode

In Dual Automatic Mode, the beacon receiver shall automatically detect all available radio beacon signals and select the best station, which shall be tracked by Channel 1. After completing a scan of all available frequencies, Channel 2 shall track the second-best available station. Since there is no other beacon channel, the beacon receiver has no capability to continue to scan for other, better signals. Therefore, the beacon receiver shall continue to track these two stations so long it is able. Should the signal on one of the channels be lost, this channel shall scan the available frequencies to determine the best signal available for tracking.

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,MOD,AUT,DUA** command to set the DG14 to operate in Dual Automatic Mode.

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,OUT** command to output the demodulated beacon data from Channel 1 or Channel 2 to the serial port.



The best beacon signal is determined based collectively on the SNR, continuity of signal reception, etc.

Manual Modes

In Manual Beacon mode, the DG14 tracks the beacon station(s) you specify. You can specify either one or two beacon stations for either Single Manual Mode or Dual Manual Mode. You must enable the Manual mode with the **\$PASHS,BCN,MOD,MAN** command and then assign frequencies to the channels.

Single Manual Mode

In Single Manual Beacon mode, the DG14 tracks the specified beacon signal on Channel 1. After enabling Manual mode with the **\$PASHS,BCN,MOD,MAN** command, use the **\$PASHS,BCN,CHN** command to assign a frequency to Channel 1.

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,OUT** command to output the demodulated beacon data from Channel 1 to the serial port.

Dual Manual Mode

In Dual Manual Beacon Mode, the DG14 tracks the two specified beacon signals on Channel 1 and Channel 2, respectively. After enabling Manual mode with the **\$PASHS,BCN,MOD,MAN** command, use the **\$PASHS,BCN,CHN** command to assign a frequency to Channel 1, and enter the command a second time to assign a frequency to Channel 2.

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,OUT** command to output the demodulated beacon data from Channel 1 or Channel 2.

Working with the Beacon Directory

The DG14 beacon directory is similar to, but usually larger than, the beacon almanac received in the RTCM Type 7 message. The Type 7 message contains information about a specific network of reference stations, and the receiver directory contains the same information for all stations. The receiver beacon directory contains:

- Default list of stations kept in ROM
- List of stations received from RTCM Type 7
- User entered stations

After a cold start the beacon directory consists of the default list of stations kept in ROM.

The beacon directory is kept in BBU. It can be erased with the

\$PASHS,BCN,DIR,CLR command. You can reset the beacon directory to the default list of stations kept in ROM only with the **\$PASHS,BCN,DIR,INI** command.

Blocking RTCM Type 7 Message

The most recently received record (RTCM Type 7 or user entry) may override preceding entries in the beacon directory. Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,RT7,Y/N** command to prevent the overwriting entries with RTCM type 7 information. The default is Y, overwrite information.

If you enable RTCM type 7 information, and receive RTCM type 7 from a station located within 30 km from any station in the beacon directory, then the existing station is replaced with the one received from RTCM Message 7 in the beacon directory. If the RTCM type 7 information received is from a station more than 30 km from any station in the Beacon directory then the new station will be added to the beacon directory.

Adding Stations to the Beacon Directory

To add a new station to the beacon directory manually, you need the following information:

- Latitude—required
- Longitude—required
- Range—optional
- Frequency—required
- Health—optional
- Station ID—required
- Bit Rate —required
- Modulation Code—optional
- Sync Type —optional
- Broadcast Coding—optional

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,DIR,ADD,f1,c1,f2,c2,f3,d1,d2[,d3,d4,d5,d6,d7]** command to add a new station to the beacon directory, where Table 8.5 outlines the parameters.

To replace a station, or delete some parameters, you must delete the station and then to add a new one.

Deleting Stations from the Beacon Directory

When deleting a station from beacon directory you need to specify the frequency, and optionally Station ID.

You can delete a station from the beacon directory with the **\$PASHS,BCN,DIR,DEL,f1[,d1]** command where f1 is the frequency and d1 is the Station ID. If Station ID is not specified then all stations with matching Frequencies are deleted from the beacon directory.

If the station you want to delete is locked, then deleting station from the beacon directory will not remove this station from lock. See 'Working with Never Used Frequencies' on page 292 to have an immediate effect on the locked stations.

Listing the Current Beacon Directory

You can list current directory with the **\$PASHQ,BCN,DIR** command. The response message consists of a series of **\$PASHR,BCN,DIR** messages, one at each output interval. The message output is in the format:

\$PASHR,BCN,DIR,n1,n2,s1,f1,f2,c2,f3,d1,d2,d3,d4,d5,d6,d7

where Table 8.6 outlines the response format:

If the information for a field is not available, then the field is set to the factory default.

You can use the following options to specify which part of the beacon directory you wish to list:

- **\$PASHQ,BCN,DIR**— view the whole directory
- **\$PASHQ,BCN,DIR,USR**— view the user entered stations only
- **\$PASHQ,BCN,DIR,RTC**— view stations from RTCM Type 7 message only
- **\$PASHQ,BCN,DIR,DEF**— view stations from the default list

Saving and Resetting the Beacon Directory

Beacon directory is automatically saved in BBU. The **\$PASHS,INI**, **\$PASHS,RST**, and **\$PASHS,SAV** commands will not affect beacon directory. Table 8.7 summarizes the commands for saving, editing, and deleting the beacon directory.

Working with Never Used Frequencies

In Automatic Modes, you can mark a frequency to “never be used” using the **\$PASHS,BCN,NVR, f1** command where f1 is the frequency.

All stations with the specified frequency will not be searched for after issuing this command.

Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,CLR,f1** command to clear the never-use mark for the specified frequency

Use the **\$PASHQ,BCN,NVR** command to query frequencies currently marked as never-use. The response message lists all frequencies marked as never-use in the format:

```
$PASHR,BCN,NVR,d1,f1,f2,...
```

where

d1 – the number of frequencies

f1,f2,... – frequencies marked as never-use

Saving and Resetting Beacon Parameters

When you save the beacon parameters, the following are saved in BBU:

- current mode
- individual channel settings (in manual mode)
- never-use frequencies
- RTCM Type 7 message blockage setting

Table 8.8 outlines the commands you can use to save and reset the beacon parameters.

Output Beacon Data to Serial Ports

You can output the beacon data to any of DG14 serial ports using the **\$PASHS,BCN,OUT,d1,c1,s1** command where d1 is Beacon Channel (1 or 2), c1 is receiver port (A or B or C), and s1 is ON or OFF.

Beacon Tracking Signal Strength:

\$PASHQ,BCN,STA

or

\$PASHS,BCN,STA,A,ON

will cause output of \$PASHR,BCN,STA message. This is a status message of the following format:

\$PASHR,BCN,STA,n1,{d1,d2,d3,f1,d4,d5,d6}...

This message should be output when locked or not locked to a station. When not locked, the last good parameters will be output.

AGC is the coefficient that the input signal is multiplied by before further processing. The stronger the input signal the smaller AGC scale value. The weaker the input signal the bigger AGC scale value. This AGC scale value is not SNR - it is the input signal+noise strength.

Integrated Differential Optimization

You can specify the source(s) of differential corrections and how these corrections are utilized. Use the **\$PASHS,RTC,SLC** command to specify the source(s) of corrections used in the navigation solution. You can choose either a single or multiple sources of corrections: SBAS, Beacon and Serial corrections (individually or in any combination/order). The default is a single source of serial corrections.

Regardless of the source of differential corrections (beacon, serial, or SBAS (full or partial) corrections), the DGPS position flag is set if any types of differential corrections are used in the navigation solution.

Utilization of Differential Corrections

If you have chosen multiple sources of corrections to be used in the navigation solution, you need to specify the method of utilization: Multi-Base

Processing, or Primary-Secondary Scenario. The default is Primary-Secondary. Use the **\$PASHS,RTC,SLC** command to list the sources in the order of preference, separated by commas.

Primary-Secondary Scenario

The navigation solution always utilizes a single source of corrections. The Primary-Secondary option has two modes: manual and automatic.

Manual Primary-Secondary

The first source in the list of corrections, specified in the **\$PASHS,RTC,SLC** command, is used as the primary source of corrections and the remaining sources listed are used as backup or 'secondary sources in the order they are listed. When the Primary source is not available, the DG14 switches to the first secondary source available. Use the **\$PASHS,RTC,SLC** command to set the Primary and Secondary sources of corrections.

If the SBAS or beacon is set to Dual Mode, the corrections provided on Channel 1 serve as Primary and Channel 2 serves as the Secondary set of corrections.

If you have multiple serial corrections available, the first set of corrections successfully decoded by the DG14 will be Primary and all other corrections marked with reference station ID's are Secondary.

Automatic Primary-Secondary:

This mode operates similarly to the Manual operation except that the DG14 automatically chooses the primary and secondary sources of corrections based on an internal set of criteria for the "best" correction source. Use the **\$PASHS,RTC,SLC,WGH** command to set the receiver in Automatic-Primary mode.



When the DG14 switches from one correction source to another, there can be decimeter-level position jumps due to change in "quality" of corrections. Any reference clock offset differences between the old and new correction sources, however, will be absorbed by the NavT/NavTdot solution parameter without reflecting on the position/velocity solution. The "Quality" of corrections includes accuracy of corrections, latency of corrections, frequency of corrections, age of corrections, baseline length and network coverage, etc...

Integrated Differential Optimization (U and D Options Required)

The DG14 offers the following options in processing correction data:

- Nearest base station
- Base station solution yielding solution with lowest RMS
- Weighted multi-base solution (weight factors include: age of correction, distance to base, satellite elevation at base, etc.) (WGH)

If the SBAS or beacon is set to Dual Mode, each Channel serves as a separate source of corrections. If multiple serial corrections are available, each set of corrections (based on reference station ID) serves as a separate source of corrections.

Multi-Base Differential Processing (U and M Options Required)

The Multi-Base feature is capable of receiving up to 8 individual correction streams (8 Ref IDs) on each serial port, for a total of 24 correction streams. The base station can be as far as 1500 km from the remote receiver. The maximum update rate is 10 Hz. This feature cannot be used in conjunction with SBAS or Internal Beacon corrections.

Differential Commands

This chapter contains the receiver commands for the following applications:

- **RTCM Commands**, on page 298
- **SBAS Commands**, on page 313
- **Beacon Commands**, on page 324

RTCM Commands

RTCM commands allow you control and monitor operation in differential mode. RTCM commands are available if the differential options are installed. If only the base station option [B] is installed, only commands controlling base station parameters are available when setting the receiver for differential operation. If only the remote differential option [U] is installed, only commands controlling remote station parameters are available when setting the receiver for differential operation. Both options must be installed in order for base station commands and remote station commands to be available to the receiver. The RTCM mode is off by default.

All but one of the RTCM commands are set commands. The set commands allow you to enable and modify a variety of parameters affecting differential operation. There is only one query command: **\$PASHQ,RTC**. This command is used to monitor differential parameters and status. Table 9.1 lists the RTCM commands.

AUT: Automatic Differential Mode

\$PASHS,RTC,AUT,s1

This command enables or disables automatic differential mode, where s1 is Y (enabled) or N (disabled). When auto differential mode is enabled, the receiver outputs raw positions automatically if differential corrections are older than the maximum age setting, or when differential corrections are not available. When auto differential mode is disabled, the receiver stops outputting positions when the age of the differential correction exceeds the maximum age setting or when differential corrections are not available, and does not resume position output until it receives RTCM corrections with age values lower than the maximum or differential mode is disabled. The automatic differential setting applies to remote differential stations only. You can view the current automatic differential setting by entering the **\$PASHQ,RTC** command and checking the AUT field.

Example

Enter the following command to turn auto differential mode on:

\$PASHS,RTC,AUT,Y

DEFAULT SETTING
RTC,AUT—Y

BAS: Set Receiver in Differential Base Station Mode

\$PASHS,RTC,BAS,c1

This command sets the DG14 to operate as an RTCM differential base station, where c1 designates the output port (A or B) for differential corrections. You can view the current RTCM mode setting by entering the **\$PASHQ,RTC** command and checking the MODE field.

Example

Enter the following command to set the receiver as an RTCM base station outputting differential corrections from port B:

\$PASHS,RTC,BAS,B

FMT: Differential Output Format

\$PASHS,RTC,FMT,s1

This command sets the differential output format to either RTCM or RTCA. s1 is either TCM or TCA.

RTCM and RTCA can also be used in place of TCM and TCA respectively.

IOD: Ephemeris Data Update Rate for RTCM Base Station

\$PASHS,RTC,IOD,d

This command sets the time period before the RTCM base station switches to a new issue of the ephemeris data (IODE) where d is the time between 0 and 90 seconds. The default is 30 seconds.

This message is applicable to receivers in RTCM BASE mode only. A base receiver continues to transmit corrections on the old ephemeris in the navigation solution until it receives an ephemeris update. After receiving new ephemeris, the receiver waits for the offset period (d) before transmitting corrections using the new ephemeris (IOD).

\$PASHQ,RTC,IOD,[c1]

This command queries for the time period for when the RTCM base station switches to a new issue of the ephemeris data, where c1 is the optional port designator for the output of the response. If a port is not specified, the receiver sends the response to the current port.

\$PASHR,RTC,IOD

The response is in the format:

where d is the set IOD switch period in seconds.

MAX: Maximum Age Threshold for Differential Corrections

\$PASHS,RTC,MAX,d1

The receiver ignores incoming corrections whose age exceeds the maximum age setting. The default value is 60. The maximum age setting applies to remote differential stations only. SBAS Commands

SBAS commands allow you control and specify usage of WAAS, EGNOS, and MSAS functionality. These commands are available only if the SBAS option [Y] is installed. When the [Y] option is installed, 2 channels are made available for tracking SBAS satellites. If you did not purchase this option, and you want to now, please call your Ashtech GNSS Board Sales Representative. See **Receiver Options**, on page 15 for more information on the available receiver options

The receiver can track twogeostationary SBAS satellites ata time and includes the ranging, ephemeris and SBAS differential correction data messages over the RS232 output ports. The DG14 can process SBAS corrections for DGPS positioning. SBAS corrections are converted to RTCM SC-104 corrections and output through the serial ports.

In the GPS+SBAS mode, the DG14retains all standard functionality, including high data output rates (raw and navigation).

The DG14 has several modes of SBAS operation:

- Automatic Mode—the receiver determines which SBAS satellite(s) to use
 - Single Automatic Mode
 - Dual Automatic Mode
- Manual Mode—you manually set which SBAS satellite(s) to use
 - Single Manual Mode
 - Dual Manual Mode

The default SBAS mode is Single.

NOTE: Satellite ID numbers 33 to 64 correspond to SBAS PRN numbers 120-138. The offset from SBAS SVID to SBAS PRN number is 87. Add 87 to SVID to derive SBAS PRN number.

INT: Integrity Information

\$PASHS,SBA,INT,s1

This command enables or disables the integrity information where s1 is ON (enable) or OFF (disable).

The DG14 will use one or two SBAS channels as a source for integrity information depending on the \$PASHS,SBA,CDU setting.



You must use the **\$PASHS,SAV** command to save the parameters set in this command to memory.

DEFAULT SETTING
SBA,INT— ON

MAN: Single Manual SBAS Mode

\$PASHS,SBA,MAN,s1

This command sets the DG14 to Single Manual SBAS mode and has the DG14 search for and track the SBAS satellite you specify for Channel 1. s1 is the 2-digit SBAS ID number (33 to 64), which will be tracked on Channel 1.

Channel 2 automatically searches for and tracks the best available SBAS signal. If the best signal is selected for Channel 1, the DG14 uses the next best signal for Channel 2.

In single mode, the demodulated SBAS data from Channel 1 are available for output and used in the navigation solution.

MAN: Dual Manual SBAS Mode

\$PASHS,SBA,MAN,s1,s2

This command sets the DG14 to Dual Manual SBAS mode and has the DG14 search for and track the SBAS satellite you specify for Channel 1 and 2. s1 is the 2-digit SBAS ID number (33 to 64), which will be tracked on Channel 1. s2 is the 2-digit SBAS ID number (33 to 64), which will be tracked on Channel 2.

In dual mode, the demodulated SBAS data from both channels are available for output and used in the navigation solution.

OFF: Disable SBAS Mode

\$PASHS,SBA,OFF

This command disables the SBAS mode. After entering this command, the DG14 will no longer track SBAS satellites, and will track 14 GPS satellites.

To reactivate the SBAS mode, issue either the **\$PASHS,SBA,DAM** or **\$PASHS,SBA,MAN** command to enable either the Automatic or Manual SBAS mode.



If you issue the **\$PASHS,SBA,OFF** command to disable the SBAS satellites, you can revert the DG14 to 12 GPS channels by entering the **\$PASHS,GPS,CHN,12** command.

PAR: Partial SBAS Corrections

\$PASHS,SBA,PAR, s1

This command enables or disables the partial output of SBAS corrections where s1 is ON (enable) or OFF (disable).

If you enable partial SBAS corrections, the DG14 will output a differential position without the whole set of fast, slow, and ionospheric components.

If you want the entire set of fast, slow, and ionospheric components along with the differential solution be sure that this command is set to OFF.



You must use the **\$PASHS,SAV** command to save the parameters set in this command to memory.

RTC: SBAS to RTCM Interface

\$PASHS,SBA,RTC, c1,d1,d2

This command sets the interface parameters for SBAS based RTCM messages. Table 9.13 defines the parameters for this command.

Either one or two SBAS channels are used for the conversion, depending on the \$PASHS,SBA,CDU setting. The save current SBAS to RTCM conversion settings to the battery back-up memory, issue the \$PASHS,SAV command.

SAM: Single Automatic Mode

\$PASHS,SBA,SAM

This command sets the DG14 to Single Automatic mode. The demodulated SBAS data from Channel 1 are used in the navigation solution.

In Single Automatic SBAS mode, the DG14 automatically detects all available SBAS signals and selects the best ONE satellite, switching automatically as you move from one coverage area to another. The automatic selection uses both SBAS channels. Channel 1 tracks the best available SBAS signal and Channel 2 scans for another available SBAS satellite signals, maintaining a SBAS satellite directory in a battery-backed memory. The quality of the SBAS satellite tracked on Channel 1 (signal strength, elevation, etc.) is continuously compared to the quality threshold. When the quality of the signal on Channel 1 is less than the quality threshold, the DG14 checks the quality of the signal of the Channel 2 satellite. If Channel 2 satellite has a better signal, the DG14 switches to it. If, on the other hand, the signal on Channel 1 drops below the threshold and the signal on Channel 2 is no better or no SBAS satellite, The DG14 continues to use and track the satellite on Channel 1.



The best SBAS satellite is determined based collectively on the satellite SNR, elevation angle, continuity of signal reception, etc.

SSO: SBAS Satellite Search Order

\$PASHS,SBA,SSO,s1[,s2,...]

This command sets the order the receiver searches for SBAS satellites where s1, s2,... are the SBAS satellite ID numbers ranging from 33 to 64, which are searched for first. The remaining satellites after the specified SBAS satellites.

The numbers 33 to 64 are used for SBAS satellites. The SBAS system PRN numbers range from 120 to 138. The offset from SBASSV ID to SBAS PRN number is 87. Add 87 to the SV ID to derive the SBAS PRN number.

Example

The following command sets SBAS PRN 122 and 134 as the first in the search list. SBAS satellite 122 has a satellite ID number 35, and SBAS satellite 134 has a satellite ID number 47.

\$PASHS,SBA,SSO,35,47

DEFAULT SETTING
SSO —Search Order Satellite IDs 35, 33, 47, 51, 34, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 48, 49, 50

USE: SBAS Satellites for Acquisition

\$PASHS,USE,SBA,c1

This command includes or excludes all SBAS satellites simultaneously, where c1 is Y (include) or N (exclude). In a case where several satellites were excluded from being tracked with the **\$PASHS,USE** command, this shortcut command once again includes all SBAS satellites for tracking.

To enable or disable the tracking of all GPS satellites, use the **\$PASHS,USE** command. See **USE: Satellites for Acquisition**, on page 149 for a description of this command.



This command does not change the current GPS/SBAS configuration.

USP: SBAS Satellites Used in Position Computation

\$PASHS,USP,SBA,s1

This command includes or excludes all SBAS satellites used in the position computation, where s1 is YES to included all or NO to exclude all. In a case where several satellites were excluded from the position computation with the **\$PASHS,USP** command, this shortcut command once again includes all SBAS satellites in the position computation.

DEFAULT SETTING
USP,SBA— NO (exclude all)

To enable or disable using all GPS satellites in the position computation, use the **\$PASHS,USP** command. See **USP: Satellites Used in Position Computation**, on page 150 for a description of this command.

If the receiver is set to single mode, the DG14 uses only the range information from Channel 1 in the navigation solution. If the receiver is set to dual mode, the DG14 uses the range information from both channels depending on the **\$PASHS,SBA,CDU** setting.

The SBAS ranging information is available in both the MCA and MBN formatted messages so that the SBAS satellite can be used seamlessly in a navigation solution.



You must use the `$PASHS,SAV` command to save the parameters set in this command to memory.

Beacon Commands

The DG14 two-channel scanning beacon receiver has two modes of operation: automatic or fixed. In both modes, the beacon receiver can provide corrections from one or two beacon stations. The beacon commands are only available with the Beacon option (N) installed. See **Receiver Options**, on page 15 for more information on available receiver options.

The DG14 beacon receiver outputs in RTCM SC-104 differential correction format.

The DG14 has several modes of beacon operation Use the **\$PASHS,BCN,ddd** command to set the beacon operation mode:

- Automatic Mode—the receiver determines which beacon station(s) to use
 - Single Automatic Mode
 - Dual Automatic Mode
- Manual Mode—you manually set which beacon station(s) to use
 - Single Manual Mode
 - Dual Manual Mode

The default Beacon mode is Single Automatic. On power up, the DG14 remembers the last beacon stations used, and begins searching with those frequencies.

DIR,CLR: Erase Beacon Directory

SAV: Save Beacon Parameters

This command saves the current channel tuning and mode selection in the battery-backed memory. The saved parameters will be used after a power cycle or after a reset.

RAIM & HLP Features

Introduction & Definitions

Two new features have recently been implemented in the DG14:

- RAIM: Receiver Autonomous Integrity Monitoring (complying with RTCA/DO-208 guidelines)
- HLP: Horizontal Protection Level.
HLP is defined as the radius of a circle in the horizontal plane, centered at the true aircraft position, that is assured to contain the indicated horizontal position, with a given probability of missed detection and false alert. The HPL value should be similar to the one output in ARINC label 130. Note that HPL computation algorithm will NOT strictly conform to the HPL definition in DO-229C as it is a document that was published at a later date.

The following important assumptions were made when implementing the RAIM algorithm in the DG14:

- DG14's RAIM does not include WAAS satellites as RTCA/DO-208 does not include them
- DG14's RAIM is supposed to work only in standalone mode and with standard LMS positioning
- WAAS integrity information will not affect DG14's RAIM.

RAIM Option

The [I] option is needed to use the RAIM operation features RAIM and HLP. If the RAIM option is not installed, then the commands used to enable these features will have no effect.

The RAIM feature is available on firmware DD00 and later versions.

Combining RAIM with Other DG14 Modes

RAIM Versus Differential

The RAIM option can only be used in standalone mode. Consequently, the receiver will not allow you to use the RAIM and a differential mode at the same time.

The RAIM feature has therefore been implemented as follows:

1. If one of the differential modes (from port, from SBAS, or from Beacon) is currently enabled in the board, then the command used to enable RAIM is intentionally made unusable.
2. If RAIM is currently enabled and a command is issued to enable one of the differential modes, then RAIM is automatically disabled. When the user chooses to return to the standalone mode, RAIM is automatically re-enabled.

RAIM Versus WAAS/EGNOS Satellites

The DG14's RAIM is supposed to work only with GPS satellites. But it is also necessary that the set of satellites used in the position solution and the set of satellites used by RAIM be exactly the same. As a consequence, the DG14 should not use WAAS/EGNOS satellites in the position solution while RAIM is enabled.

This is implemented in the following way: By default, WAAS/EGNOS satellites are always used in the position solution. When the command to enable RAIM is issued, all WAAS/EGNOS satellites are automatically rejected from the position solution. After RAIM is disabled, all WAAS/EGNOS satellites will automatically be re-used in the position solution.

If the enabling of the RAIM feature is the reason why WAAS/EGNOS satellites are not used in the position solution, then these satellites should be marked with the letter "R" in SAT messages when SUI=ON.

RAIM Versus KFP Mode

The DG14's RAIM is supposed to work only in standalone mode with standard LMS positioning. Actually RTCA/DO-208 requires that the position computation algorithm be LMS. It means that RAIM is not compatible with KFP positioning. Therefore RAIM and KFP cannot be used at the same time.

This is implemented in the following way:

The DG14's implementation is the following.

1. If the KFP mode is currently enabled, then the command used to enable RAIM is intentionally made unsable
2. Conversely, if the RAIM feature is currently enabled, then the command used to enable the KFP mode is intentionally made unsable.

RAIM Algorithm

RAIM (Receiver Autonomous Integrity Monitoring) provides the detection of anomalous satellite pseudorange error with miss detection probability 0.999 and false alarm probability 0.002 per hour (requirements from RTCA/DO-208) under given horizontal alarm limit in range 200 m to 2 nautical miles.

In addition, RAIM isolates wrong satellite and corrects position and velocity errors. RAIM includes three procedures that are called every epoch. The first one is Availability Check which checks current satellites constellation available to determine the possibility of anomalous error detection with given alarm threshold, false alarm and miss detection probabilities. Availability percentage depends on alarm threshold value, satellites number and their position. The less alarm threshold is, the less availability percentage will be.

For example, if 7 satellites with good PDOP are in view and alarm threshold is the one nautical mile (terminal mode), detection is always available. If only 4 satellites are visible, detection is impossible.

If detection is available then Detection procedure is called. Detection algorithm compares the residuals with threshold depending upon the number of redundant satellites in view. If the threshold is exceeded then anomalous error is detected.

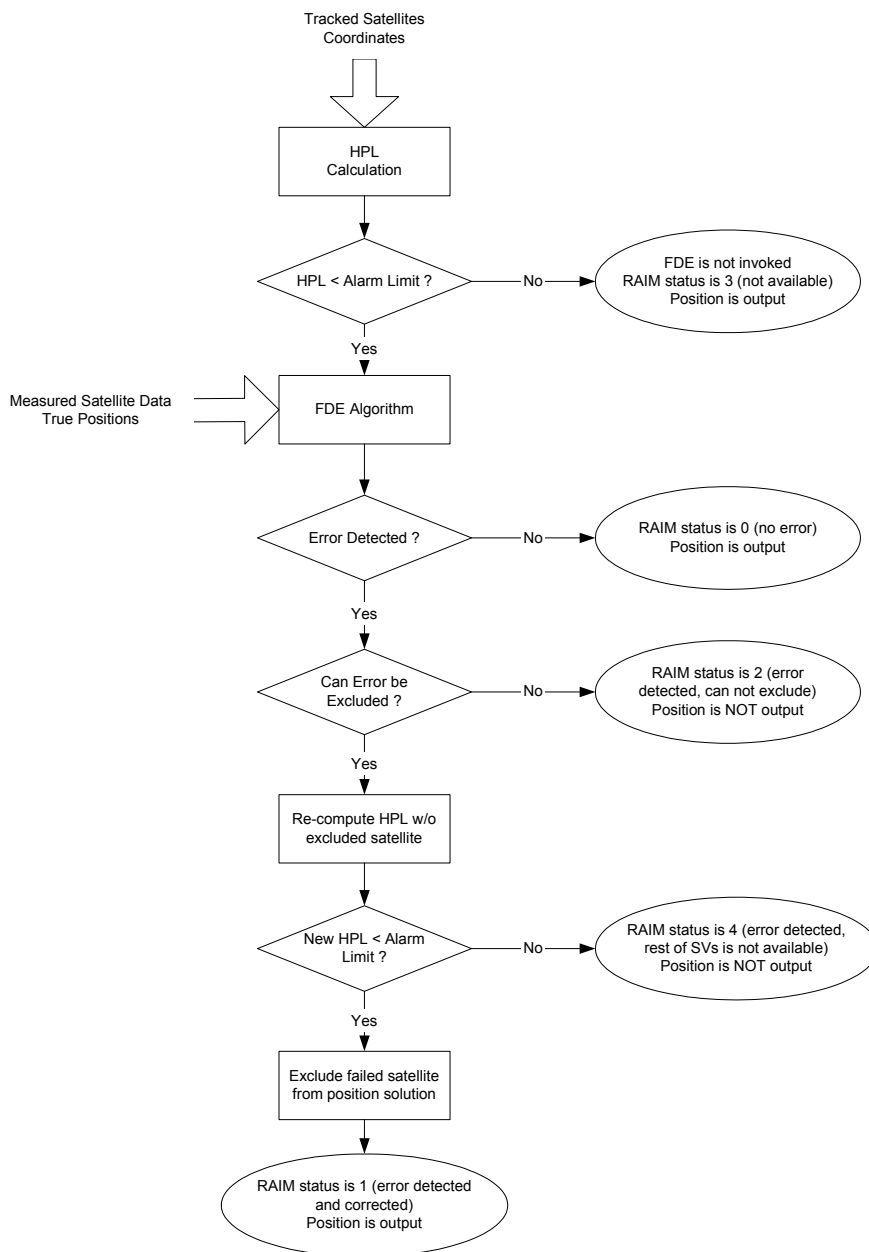
RAIM is a snapshot type algorithm, so detection usually takes place at the first epoch after the alarm limit being exceeded. If error is detected and at least 6 satellites with good PDOP are in view, then the Exclusion And Correction algorithm is called.

The Exclusion And Correction algorithm determines the number of "wrong" satellites by maximal normalized residual, after that the position and velocity are corrected by exclusion of that "wrong" satellite. To avoid possible incorrect isolation, the rest of the satellites' set is tested by Availability Check and Detection algorithm. If the rest of the satellites' set is available and no error is detected, it means the successful correction of position and velocity.

The procedures above can be executed recursively. It provides the possibility of more than one simultaneously wrong satellite exclusion.

However, in some cases where not enough satellites are available or too many errors are detected, the probability requirement cannot be met because of statistical limitations.

UDM Utility

If you have purchased the User Defined Messaging option [X], then you can use the UDM Utility program to create the script file which defines the custom messages. You can use the custom message feature to set the receiver to output only the information you need in a single message. This can save you from sending several receiver commands.

Installing UDM Utility

UDM Utility is designed for 32-bit operating systems: Windows 95, 98, 2000, or NT4.0, with a 486/66 computer or better.

To install the UDM Utility program, perform the following steps:

1. Insert the UDM Utility installation disk.
2. Click on the Windows Start menu and select "Run".
3. Type in "a:\setup.exe", where the "a:" is the letter of your CD-ROM drive.
4. Follow the instructions of the installation program.

Introduction

UDM Utility is intended to create the format of a receiver command. Receiver commands are used to output various operating/solution parameters such as elevation mask, latitude of antenna, and operating mode. UDM Utility allows the user to create commands to output solution or receiver parameters. The user can construct a project with output commands, then compile this project and upload to the GPS receiver.

Components of UDM Utility

When using UDM Utility, you create and edit a project file. Within the project file are the following file types:

- *.rdf—Receiver Definition File contains variables available for a specific receiver and used to create messages. Each receiver type has the own receiver definition file.
- *.ash—GPS receiver data file with the Ashtech commands for a specific receiver. Each receiver type has a unique *.ash file
- *.mdf—Message Definition File contains user-defined messages uploaded and saved to the receiver.
- *.prj—Project file

When you open a project, UDM utilizes the *.rdf and *.ash files for the receiver. The *.mdf file is created when you save the project. Figure 1 shows the relationships between the different components of UDM.

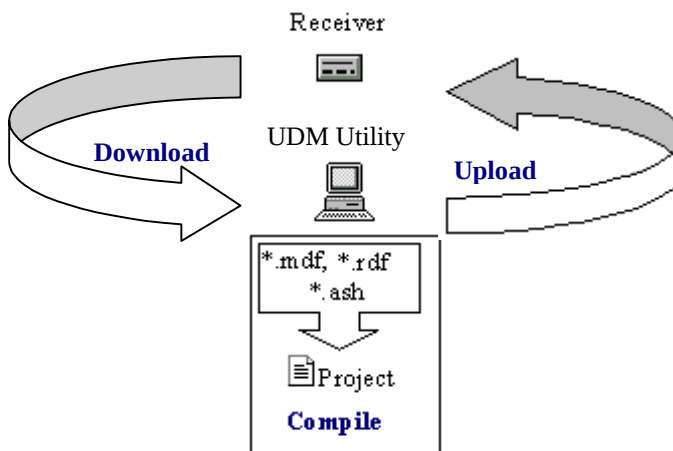


Figure A.1. Component of UDM

Operation

You can start UDM Utility from your Windows desktop.

To start UDM Utility, from the **Start** menu **Programs** folder, select **UDM Utility** from the **UDM Utility** folder. The UDM Utility main window opens.

Creating a New Project

To create a new UDM Utility project:

1. Select **New Project** from the **Project** menu.
The **New Project** dialog box opens.
2. Enter the filename for the new project in the **File Name** field. The program automatically adds `.prj` extension to the filename.
3. Click **Open**.
The **New Project** dialog box closes and the **Attach Receiver** data files dialog box opens.
4. Navigate to the directory which contains the `.rdf` file you want to attach to the project, and double-click file or click **Open**.
UDM Utility creates a new project and displays the project name on the title bar of the main window.

Opening an Existing Project

To open an existing UDM Utility project:

1. Select **Open Project** from the **Project** menu.
The **New Project** dialog box opens.
2. Double-click the `.prj` file you want to open or type the filename in the File name field.
3. Click **Open**.

Understanding UDM Utility Environment

When you start UDM Utility, you can see the three distinct windows of the program environment:

- The Folder list
- The Message Parameters pane
- The Warning window



If you do not see the Warning window, drag up the pane separator at the bottom of the main window.

Folder List

The **Folder** list (Figure 2) contains the all messages of the project. To view the message variables and parameters for a given message, double-click on the command.

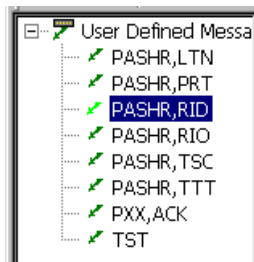


Figure A.2. Folder List

Warning Window

The **Warning** window reflects errors and warnings. These messages appear during the files reading and writing, compiling or uploading of a project, etc. and informs you about ending of some long-run processes, such as the end of uploading.

Creating a Custom Message

To create a new message:

1. Open the project.
2. Click in the left pane.
3. Select **Add New Message** from the **Edit** menu.
4. Start to fill the field of the Message Parameter pane.
5. Select **Save Project** from the **File** menu to save the new message.



You can copy, paste from the clipboard, and delete the selected message by using the corresponding commands in the Edit menu.

Editing Message

To assign new variables to or edit an existing messages:

1. Select the message you want to edit.
2. Double-click the message or select **Edit Message** from the **Edit** menu. The fields of the **Message Parameter** pane populate.
3. Enter the new variables of the message.
4. Select **Save Project** from the **File** menu to save the edited message.

Defining Message Parameters

When you create a custom message, you must fill out the information in the **Message Parameter** pane.

1. Enter a three letter title for the message in the **Title** field. The title must not be in use by the receiver.
2. Enter a brief description for the message in the **Description** field.
3. Select **Ashtech** or **Other** in the **Header** field for the message prefix. If you selected **Other**, select **PASHR** or type in any word.
4. Select **ASCII** or **Binary** in the **Message Type** field to correspond to if you want your message output in ASCII or binary format.
5. Select the **Tree** radio button to view the available variables by function.
6. Click on the message group you want to add to your message (such as Communication) in the **Available Variables** list.

The available variables for the group appear beneath the message group. Variables from the Miscellaneous group can be added anywhere in the custom message.

7. Double-click on a group or variable, or select a group or variable and press the **Add to Parameter** list button.

The selected variable appears in the **Message Variables** list with **(empty)** as a sub-heading.

8. Check the **Optional** check box if you want the group or variable to be optional.
9. Select the type you want to convert the variable to in the **Convert to** field.
10. Select a format for the variable display in the **Format** field.
11. Enter the maximum number of digits you want to appear before the decimal point for the variable in the **Max Digits Before** field.
12. Enter the maximum number of digits you want to appear after the decimal point for the variable in the **Max Digits After** field.

13. If the variable requires a positive or negative indicator, check the **Mandatory Sign** check box.
14. If you want the variable displayed using a multiplier, enter the multiplier in the **Multiplier** field.
15. Click the **Save Message** button to save your changes to the message.
16. Select (empty).
17. Repeat steps 6 to 16 for each group or variable you want to add to the **Message Variable** list.
18. To save project and message, select **Save** from the **File** menu.

Uploading Messages to a Receiver

After you have created and saved a custom message, you need to upload the user-defined data file to your receiver.

1. Verify that your receiver is connected to your PC and that you can communicate with your receiver.
2. Open the project file with the message formats you wish to upload to your receiver.
3. Select **Upload** from the **File** menu.
4. In the **Port Settings** dialog box, select the COM port that your receiver is connected.
5. Change the baud rate, if necessary.
6. Click **OK**.

UDM initiates communication with your receiver and uploads the message formats to your receiver. The status bar in the dialog box shows the progression of the data upload.

7. Click .



UDM uploads the message formats in the background. You can continue to work in the project file while the upload progresses.

Floating Point Data Representation

The DG14 stores the floating point data types using the IEEE single and double precision format. The formats contain a **sign bit field**, an **exponent field**, and a **fraction field**. The value is represented in these three fields.

Sign Bit Field

The sign bit field of the number being represented is stored in the sign bit field. If the number is positive, the sign bit field contains the value 0. If the number is negative, the sign bit field contains the value 1. The sign bit field is stored in the most significant bit of a floating point value.

Exponent Field

The exponent of a number is multiplied by the fractional value of the number to get a value. The exponent field of the number contains a biased form of the exponent. The bias is subtracted from the exponent field to get the actual exponent. This allows both positive and negative exponents.

Fraction Field

The IEEE floating point format stores the fractional part of a number in a normalized form. This form assumes that all non-zero numbers are of the form:

1.xxxxxx (binary)

The character 'x' represents either a 0 or 1 (binary).

Because all floating point binary numbers begin with 1, the 1 becomes the implicit normalized bit and is omitted. It is the most significant bit of the fraction, and the binary point is located immediately to its right. All bits after the binary point

represent values less than 1 (binary). For example, the number 1.625 (decimal) can be represented as:

1.101 (binary) which is equal to:

$2^0 + 2^{-1} + 2^{-3}$ (decimal) which is equal to:

$1 + 0.5 + 0.125$ (decimal) which is equal to:

1.625 (decimal).

The Represented Value

The value of the number being represented is equal to the exponent multiplied by the fractional value, with the sign specified by the sign bit field.

If both the exponent field and the fraction field are equal to zero, the number being represented will also be zero.

Note that in some systems (Intel-based PCs in particular) the order of the bytes will be reversed.

Single-Precision Float

The single precision format uses four consecutive bytes, with the 32 bits containing a sign bit field, an 8-bit biased exponent field, and a 23-bit fraction field. The exponent has a bias of 7F (hexadecimal). The fraction field is precise to 7 decimal digits. The single-precision format can represent values in the range 1.18×10^{-38} to 3.4×10^{38} (decimal), 1.

- The exponent field is equal to 7F (hexadecimal). The exponent is calculated by subtracting the bias value (7F) from the exponent field value. The result is 0.

$$7F - 7F = 0$$

The exponent multiplier is equal to 2^0 , which is equal to 1 (decimal).

- The fraction field is equal to .0. After adding the implicit normalized bit, the fraction is equal to 1.0 (binary). The fraction value is equal to 2^0 (decimal), which is equal to 1 (decimal).
- The value of the number is positive $1*1 = 1.0$ (decimal).

In 1, the value 0.75 is calculated by the following method:

- The sign of the value is positive because the sign bit field is equal to 0.
- The exponent field is equal to 7E (hexadecimal). The exponent is calculated by subtracting the bias value (7F) from the exponent field value. The result is -1 (decimal).

$$7E - 7F = -1$$

The exponent multiplier is equal to 2^{-1} , which is equal to 0.5 (decimal).

- The fraction field is equal to .1 (binary). After adding the implicit normalized bit, the fraction is equal to 1.1 (binary). The fraction value is equal to $2^0 + 2^{-1}$ (decimal), which is equal to $1 + 0.5$ (decimal), which is equal to 1.5 (decimal).
- The value of the number is positive $0.5*1.5 = 0.75$ (decimal).

Double-Precision Float

The double-precision format uses eight consecutive bytes, with the 64 bits containing a sign bit field, an 11-bit biased exponent field, and a 52-bit fraction field. The exponent has a bias of 3FF (hexadecimal). The fraction field is precise to 15 decimal digits. The double-precision format can represent values in the range $9.46*10^{-308}$ to $1.79*10^{308}$ (decimal), 2.

Aerotriangulation (phototriangulation)

A complex process vital to aerial **Photogrammetry** that involves extending vertical and/or horizontal control so that the measurements of angles and/or distances on overlapping photographs are related to a spatial solution using the perspective principles of the photographs. Aerotriangulation consists of mathematically extending the vectors/angles of the triangular pattern of known reference points on or near the designated photo-block terrain upward through a rectangle representing the area of the photo-block (as seen by the camera's optical center) in such a way that the tree-point terrain triangle and the camera's eye three-point triangle (within the photographic frame) are analogous.

AGE Age of Data

ALM See **Almanac**

Almanac
A set of parameters used by a GPS receiver to predict the approximate locations of all GPS satellites and the expected satellite clock offsets. Each GPS satellite contains and transmits the almanac data for all GPS satellites

(See **Ellipsoid**).

ALT Altitude

Ambiguity
The initial bias in a carrier-phase observation of an arbitrary number of carrier cycles; the uncertainty of the number of carrier cycles a receiver is attempting to count. If wavelength is known, the distance to a satellite can be computed once the number of cycles is established via carrier-phase processing.

ANT Antenna

Antenna
A variety of GPS antennas ranging from simpler microstrip devices to complex choke ring antennas that mitigate the effects of multipath scattering.

Anti-Spoofing (AS)
The process of encrypting the P-Code modulation sequence so the code cannot be replicated by hostile forces. When encrypted, the P-Code is referred to as the Y-Code.

ASCII
American Standard Code for Information Interchange. A set of characters (letters, numbers, symbols) used to display and transfer digital data in human-readable format.

Atomic clock

A clock whose frequency is maintained using electromagnetic waves that are emitted or absorbed in the transition of atomic particles between energy states. The frequency of an atomic transition is very precise, resulting in very stable clocks. A cesium clock has an error of about one second in one million years. For redundancy purposes, GPS satellites carry multiple atomic clocks. GPS satellites have used rubidium clocks as well as cesium clocks. The GPS Master Control Station uses cesium clocks and a hydrogen master clock.

Argument of latitude

The sum of the true anomaly and the argument of perigee.

Argument of perigee

The angle or arc from the ascending node to the closest approach of the orbiting body to the focus or perigee, as measured at the focus of an elliptical orbit, in the orbital plane in the direction of motion of the orbiting body.

Ascending node

The point at which an object's orbit crosses the reference plane (e.g., equatorial plane) from south to north.

Azimuth

A horizontal direction expressed as the angular distance between a fixed direction and the direction of the object.

AZM

See Azimuth

B

Bandwidth

A measure of the information-carrying

capacity of a signal expressed as the width of the spectrum of that signal (frequency domain representation) in Hertz.

Baseline

The measured distance between two receivers or two antennas

Bias

See **Integer bias terms**

BIN

Binary Index (file)

C

C/A

Coarse Acquisition

C/A code

A sequence of 1023 bits (0 or 1) that repeats every millisecond. Each satellite broadcasts a unique 1023-bit sequence that allows a receiver to distinguish between various satellites. The C/A-Code modulates only the L1 carrier frequency on GPS satellites. The C/A-Code allows a receiver to Carrier frequency

The basic frequency of an unmodulated radio signal. GPS satellite navigation signals are broadcast on two L-band frequencies, L1 and L2 is at 1575.42 Mhz, and L2 is at 1227.6 Mhz.

Carrier phase

The phase of either the L1 or L2 carrier of a GPS signal, measured by a receiver while locked-on to the signal (also known as integrated Doppler).

CEP

See Circular error probable.

Channel

Refers to the hardware in a receiver that

allows the receiver to detect, lock-on and continuously track the signal from a single satellite. The more receiver channels available, the greater number of satellite signals a receiver can simultaneously lock-on and track.

Chip

The length of time to transmit either a zero or a one in a binary pulse code.

Chip rate

Number of chips per second (e.g., C/A code = 1.023 MHz).

Circular Error Probable

A circle's radius, centered at the true antenna position, containing 50% of the points in the horizontal scatter plot.

Clock offset

The difference in time between GPS time and a satellite clock or a sensor clock (less accurate).

COG

Course Over Ground

Constellation

Refers to the collection of orbiting GPS satellites. The GPS constellation consists of 24 satellites in 12-hour circular orbits at an altitude of 20,200 kilometers. In the nominal constellation, four satellites are spaced in each of six orbital planes. The constellation was selected to provide a very high probability of satellite coverage even in the event of satellite outages.

CTD

Course To Destination

Cycle slip

A loss of count of carrier cycles as they are being measured by a GPS receiver.

Loss of signal, ionospheric interference and other forms of interference cause cycle slips to occur.

D**DGPS**

See Differential GPS

Differential GPS (DGPS)

A technique whereby data from a receiver at a known location is used to correct the data from a receiver at an unknown location. Differential corrections can be applied in real-time or by post-processing. Since most of the errors in GPS are common to users in a wide area, the DGPS-corrected solution is significantly more accurate than a normal SPS solution.

Differential processing

GPS measurements can be differenced between receivers, satellites, and epochs. Although many combinations are possible, the present convention for differential processing of GPS measurements is to take differences between receivers (single difference), then between satellites (double difference), then between measurement epochs (triple difference). A single-difference measurement between receivers is the instantaneous difference in phase of the signal from the same satellite, measured by two receivers simultaneously. A double-difference measurement is the difference for a chosen reference satellite. A triple-difference measurement is the difference between a double difference at one epoch and the same double difference at the previous epoch.

Differential (relative) positioning

Determination of relative coordinates of two or more receivers which are simultaneously tracking the same satellites. Dynamic differential positioning is a real-time calibration technique achieved by sending corrections to the roving user from one or more reference stations. Static differential GPS involves determining baseline vectors between pairs of receivers.

Dilution of Precision (DOP)

A measure of the receiver-satellite(s) geometry. DOP relates the statistical accuracy of the GPS measurements to the statistical accuracy of the solution. Geometric Dilution of Precision (GDOP) is composed of Time Dilution of Precision (TDOP); and Position Dilution of Precision (PDOP), which are composed of Horizontal Dilution of Precision (HDOP); and Vertical Dilution of Precision (VDOP).

DOP

Dilution of Precision

Doppler aiding

The use of Doppler carrier-phase measurements to smooth code-phase position measurements.

Doppler shift

An apparent change in signal frequency which occurs as the transmitter and receiver move toward or away from one another.

Double difference

The arithmetic differencing of carrier phases measured simultaneously by a pair of receivers tracking the same pair of satellites. Single differences are obtained by each receiver from each

satellite; these differences are then differenced in turn, which essentially deletes all satellite and receiver clock errors.

DTD

Distance to Destination

Dynamic positioning

Determination of a timed series of sets of coordinates for a moving receiver, each set of coordinates being determined from a single data sample, and usually computed in real-time.

E

Earth Centered, Earth Fixed (ECEF)

A cartesian coordinate system centered at the earth's center of mass. The Z-axis is aligned with the earth's mean spin axis. The X-axis is aligned with the zero meridian. The Y-axis is 90 degrees west of the X-axis, forming a right-handed coordinate system.

EDOP

Elevation Dilution of Precision

Elevation

Height above mean sea level. Vertical distance above the geoid.

Elevation mask

An adjustable feature of GPS receivers that specifies that a satellite must be at least a specified number of degrees above the horizon before the signals from the satellite are to be used. Satellites at low elevation angles (five degrees or less) have lower signal strengths and are more prone to loss of lock thus causing noisy solutions.

Elevation mask angle

That angle below which it is not advisable to track satellites. Typically the elevation mask is set to 5° to avoid interference problems caused by buildings and trees and multipath reflections.

Ellipsoid

In geodesy, unless otherwise specified, a mathematical figure formed by revolving an ellipse about its minor axis. It is often used interchangeably with spheroid. Two quantities define an ellipsoid; the length of the semimajor axis, a , and the flattening, $f = (a - b)/a$, where b is the length of the semiminor axis. Prolate and triaxial ellipsoids are invariably described as such.

Ellipsoid height

The measure of vertical distance above the ellipsoid. Not the same as elevation above sea level. GPS receiver output position fix height in the WGS-84 datum.

Ephemeris

A set of parameters used by a GPS receiver to predict the location of a single GPS satellite and its clock behavior. Each GPS satellite contains and transmits ephemeris data for its own orbit and clock. Ephemeris data is more accurate than the almanac data but is applicable over a short time frame (four to six hours). Ephemeris data is transmitted by the satellite every 30 seconds.

Epoch

Measurement interval or data frequency, as in making observations every 15 seconds. Loading data using

30-second epochs means loading every other measurement.

F

FCC

Federal Communications Commission

Firmware

The coded instructions relating to receiver function, and (sometimes) data processing algorithms, embedded as integral portions of the internal circuitry.

Flattening

$f = (a - b)/a = 1 - (1 - e^2)^{1/2}$ where
 a = semimajor axis
 b = semiminor axis
 e = Eccentricity

G

GDOP

Geometric Dilution of Precision. The relationship between errors in user position and time and in satellite range. $GDOP^2 = PDOP^2 + TDOP^2$. See Position Dilution of Precision.

Geodetic datum (horizontal datum)

A specifically oriented ellipsoid typically defined by eight parameters which establish its dimensions, define its center with respect to Earth's center of mass and specify its orientation in relation to the Earth's average spin axis and Greenwich reference meridian.

Geodetic height (ellipsoidal height)

The height of a point above an ellipsoidal surface. The difference between a point's geodetic height and its orthometric height equals the geoidal height.

Geoid

The equipotential surface of the Earth's gravity field which best fits mean sea level. Geoids currently in use are GEOID84 and GEOID90.

Geoidal height (geoidal separation; undulation)

The height of a point on the geoid above the ellipsoid measured along a perpendicular to the ellipsoid.

GLL

Position Latitude/Longitude

GMST

Greenwich Mean Sidereal Time

GPS DIFF

Differential

GPS ICD-200

The GPS Interface Control Document is a government document that contains the full technical description of the interface between the satellites and the user. GPS receiver must comply with this specification if it is to receive and process GPS signals properly.

GPS week

GPS time started at Saturday/Sunday midnight, January 6, 1980. The GPS week is the number of whole weeks since GPS time zero.

Greenwich mean time (GMT)

See universal time. In this text, they are often used interchangeably.

H**HDOP**

Horizontal Dilution of Precision. See Dilution of Precision.

HI

Height of Instrument

HTDOP

Horizontal/Time Dilution of Precision. See Dilution of Precision.

I**ID**

Identification or Integrated Doppler

Integer bias terms

The receiver counts the carrier waves from the satellite, as they pass the antenna, to a high degree of accuracy. However, it has no information number of waves to the satellite at the time it started counting. This unknown number of wavelengths between the satellite and the antenna is the integer bias term.

Integrated Doppler

A measurement of Doppler shift frequency or phase over time.

Ionosphere

Refers to the layers of ionized air in the atmosphere extending from 70 kilometers to 700 kilometers and higher. Depending on frequency, the ionosphere can either block radio signals completely or change the propagation speed. GPS signals penetrate the ionosphere but are delayed. The ionospheric delays can be predicted using models, though with relatively poor accuracy, or measured using two receivers.

Ionospheric delay

A wave propagating through the ionosphere [which is a nonhomogeneous (in space and time) and dispersive medium] experiences delay. Phase delay depends on electron content and affects carrier signals.

Group delay depends on dispersion in the ionosphere as well, and affects signal modulation (codes). The phase and group delay are of the same magnitude but opposite sign.

J

Julian date

The number of days that have elapsed since 1 January 4713 B.C. in the Julian calendar. GPS time zero is defined to be midnight UTC, Saturday/Sunday, 6 January 1980 at Greenwich. The Julian date for GPS time zero is 2,444,244.5.

K

Kinematic surveying

A method which initially solves wavelength ambiguities and retains the resulting measurements by maintaining a lock on a specific number of satellites throughout the entire surveying period.

L

L1

The primary L-band signal radiated by each NAVSTAR satellite at 1575.42 MHz. The L1 beacon is modulated with the C/A and P codes, and with the NAV message. L2 is centered at 1227.60 MHz and is modulated with the P code and the NAV message.

L-band

A nominal portion of the microwave electro-magnetic spectrum ranging from 390 MHz to 1.55 GHz.

LNA

Low-Noise Amplifier

M

MSG

RTCM Message

MSL

Mean Sea Level

Multichannel receiver

A receiver containing many independent channels. Such a receiver offers highest SNR because each channel tracks one satellite continuously.

Multipath

The reception of a signal both along a direct path and along one or more reflected paths. The resulting signal results in an incorrect pseudo-range measurement. The classical example of multipath is the "ghosting" that appears on television when an airplane passes overhead.

Multipath error

A positioning error resulting from interference between radio waves which have traveled between the transmitter and the receiver by two paths of different electrical lengths.

Multiplexing

A technique used in some GPS receivers to sequence the signals of two or more satellites through a single hardware channel. Multiplexing allows a receiver to track more satellites than the number of hardware channels at the cost of lower effective signal strength.

Multiplexing channel

A receiver channel which is sequenced through several satellite signals (each from a specific satellite at a specific frequency) at a rate which is

synchronous with the satellite message bit-rate (50 bits per second, or 20 milliseconds per bit). Thus, one complete sequence is completed in a multiple of 20 milliseconds.

N

NMEA

National Marine Electronics Association

NV

Non-Volatile. Usually refers to a memory device that retains data after power is removed.

O

Outage

The occurrence in time and space of a GPS dilution of precision value exceeding a specified maximum.

P

Position Dilution of Precision (PDOP)

A unitless figure of merit expressing the relationship between the error in user position and the error in satellite position. Geometrically, PDOP is proportional to 1 divided by the volume of the pyramid formed by lines running from the receiver to four satellites observed. Values considered 'good' for positioning are small, say 3. Values greater than 7 are considered poor. Thus, small PDOP is associated with widely separated satellites. PDOP is related to horizontal and vertical DOP by $PDOP^2 = HDOP^2 + VDOP^2$. Small PDOP is important in positioning, but much less so in surveying.

Photogrammetry

An aerial remote sensing technique whose latest innovations employ a high-resolution aerial camera with forward motion compensation and uses GPS technology for pilot guidance over the designated photo block(s).

Photogrammetry forms the baseline of many Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and Land Information System (LIS) studies.

Point positioning

A geographic position produced from one receiver in a stand-alone mode. At best, position accuracy obtained from a stand-alone receiver is 5 meters to less than 1 meter, depending on the geometry of the satellites.

POS

Position

Post-processing

The reduction and processing of GPS data after the data was collected in the field. Post-processing is usually accomplished on a computer in an office environment where appropriate software is employed to achieve optimum position solutions.

Precise Positioning System (PPS)

The more accurate GPS capability that is restricted to authorized, typically military, users.

Pseudo-kinematic surveying

A variation of the kinematic method where roughly five-minute site occupations are repeated at a minimum of once each hour.

Pseudorandom noise (PRN)

The P(Y) and C/A codes are pseudorandom noise sequences which

modulate the navigation signals. The modulation appears to be random noise but is, in fact, predictable hence the term "pseudo" random. Use of this technique allows the use of a single frequency by all GPS satellites and also permits the satellites to broadcast a low power signal.

Pseudo-range

The measured distance between the GPS receiver antenna and the GPS satellite. The pseudo-range is approximately the geometric range biased by the offset of the receiver clock from the satellite clock. The receiver actually measures a time difference which is related to distance (range) by the speed of propagation.

R

RAM

Random-Access Memory. A memory device whose data can be accessed at random, as opposed to sequential access. RAM data is lost when power is removed.

Range rate

The rate of change of range between the satellite and receiver. The range to a satellite changes due to satellite and observer motions. Range rate is determined by measuring the doppler shift of the satellite beacon carrier.

RDOP

Relative Dilution of Precision. See Dilution of Precision.

Reconstructed carrier phase

The difference between the phase of the incoming Doppler-shifted GPS

carrier and the phase of a nominally constant reference frequency generated in the receiver. For static positioning, the reconstructed carrier phase is sampled at epochs determined by a clock in the receiver. The reconstructed carrier phase changes according to the continuously integrated Doppler shift of the incoming signal biased by the integral of the frequency offset between the satellite and receiver reference oscillators.

Real-time

Refers to immediate, GPS data collection, processing and position determination (usually) within a receiver's firmware after the fact with a computer in an office environment.

Reference Network

A series of monuments or reference points with accurately measured vectors/distances that is used as a reference basis for cadastral and other types of survey.

Reference station

A point (site) where crustal stability, or tidal current constants, have been determined through accurate observations, and which is then used as a standard for the comparison of simultaneous observations at one or more subordinate stations. Certain of these are known as Continuous Operating Reference Stations (CORS), and transmit reference data on a 24-hour basis.

Relative positioning

The process of determining the relative difference in position between two points with greater precision than that to which

the position of a single point can be determined. Here, a receiver (antenna) is placed over each point and measurements are made by observing the same satellite at the same time. This technique allows cancellation (during computations) of all errors which are common to both observers, such as satellite clock errors, propagation delays, etc. See also Translocation and Differential Navigation.

RF

Radio Frequency

RFI

Radio Frequency Interference

RINEX

The Reciever-Independent EXchange format for GPS data, which includes provisions for pseudo-range, carrier-phase, and Doppler observations.

RMS

Root Mean Square. A statistical measure of the scatter of computed positions about a "best fit" position solution. RMS can be applied to any random variable.

A standard format used in the transmission of differential corrections.

S

Selective Availability (SA)

The process whereby DOD dithers the

satellite clock and/or broadcasts erroneous orbital ephemeris data to create a pseudo-range error

SEP

See Spherical Error Probable

Sidereal day

Time between two successive upper transits of the vernal equinox.

Sidereal time

The hour angle of the vernal equinox. Taking the mean equinox as the reference yields true or apparent Sidereal Time. Neither Solar nor Sidereal Time are constant, since angular velocity varies due to fluctuations caused by the Earth's polar moment of inertia as exerted through tidal deformation and other mass transports.

Single difference

The arithmetic differencing of carrier phases simultaneously measured by a pair of receivers tracking the same satellite (between receivers and satellite), or by a single receiver tracking two satellites (between-satellite and receivers); the former essentially deletes all satellite clock errors, while the latter essentially deletes all receiver errors.

Spherical Error Probable (SEP)

A statistical measure of precision defined as the 50th percentile value of the three-dimensional position error statistics. Thus, half of the results are within a 3D SEP value.

Spoofing

The process of replicating the GPS code in such a way that the user computes incorrect position solutions.

SPS

See Standard Positioning Service

Standard Positioning Service (SPS)

Uses the C/A code to provide a minimum level of dynamic- or static-positioning capability. The accuracy of this service is set at a level consistent with national security.

Static observations

A GPS survey technique requiring roughly one hour of observation, with two or more receivers observing simultaneously, and results in high accuracies and vector measurements.

Static positioning

Positioning applications in which the positions of static or near static points are determined.

SV

Satellite Vehicle, Satellite Visibility or Space Vehicle.

Switching channel

A receiver channel which is sequenced through a number of satellite signals (each from a specific satellite and at a specific frequency) at a rate which is slower than, and asynchronous with, the message data rate.

T

TDOP

Time Dilution of Precision. See Dilution of Precision.

TOW

Time of week, in seconds, from midnight Sunday GPS.

Translocation

A version of relative positioning which

makes use of a known position, such as a USGS survey mark, to aid in the accurate positioning of a desired point. Here, the position of the mark, determined using GPS, is compared with the accepted value. The three-dimensional differences are then used in the calculations for the second point.

Tropospheric correction.

The correction applied to the measurement to account for tropospheric delay. This value is obtained from the modified Hopfield model.

True anomaly

The angular distance, measured in the orbital plane from the earth's center (occupied focus) from the perigee to the current location of the satellite (orbital body).

U

Universal Time Coordinated (UTC)

Time as maintained by the U.S. Naval Observatory. Because of variations in the Earth's rotation, UTC is sometimes adjusted by an integer second. The accumulation of these adjustments compared to GPS time, which runs continuously, has resulted in an 11 second offset between GPS time and UTC at the start of 1996. After accounting for leap seconds and using adjustments contained in the navigation message, GPS time can be related to UTC within 20 nanoseconds or better.

User Range Accuracy (URA)

The contribution to the range-measurement error from an individual error source (apparent clock and

ephemeris prediction accuracies), converted into range units, assuming that the error source is uncorrelated with all other error sources. Values less than 10 are preferred.

UT

Universal Time

UTM

Universal Transverse Mercator Map Projection. A special case of the Transverse Mercator projection. Abbreviated as the UTM Grid, it consists of 60 north-south zones, each 6 degrees wide in longitude.

V

VDC

Volts Direct Current

VDOP

Vertical Dilution of Precision. See Dilution of Precision and Position Dilution of Precision.

W

WGS

World Geodetic System

World Geodetic System 1984 (WGS-84)

A set of U.S. Defense Mapping Agency parameters for determining global geometric and physical geodetic relationships. Parameters include a geocentric reference ellipsoid; a coordinate system; and a gravity field model. GPS satellite orbital information in the navigation message is referenced to WGS-84.

World Geodetic System (WGS-72)

The mathematical reference ellipsoid previously used by GPS, having a semimajor axis of 6378.135 km and a flattening of 1/298.26.

Y

Y-Code

The designation for the end result of P-Code during Anti-Spoofing (AS) activation by DoD.

Y-code tracking, civilian

Signal squaring (now obsolete) multiplies the signal by itself, thus deleting the carrier's code information and making distance measurement (ranging) impossible. Carrier phase measurements can still be accomplished, although doubling the carrier frequency halves the wavelength.
